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### Foreword

*Notable Nativities* was written to demonstrate the validity of new reliable methods for the rectification of natal charts. This is of prime importance, as a reliable interpretation is only possible from a correctly rectified chart.

It is my experience that the individuality of any natal chart hinges on the exact identification of its angles, not on interplanetary aspects which will be very much the same for all persons born on the same day. Indeed for the slower planets some aspects may continue for weeks, even months. These characteristics also depend on the position of the Ascendant in a sign of the tropical Zodiac. Interplanetary aspects that have no connection to angles or house cusps only become active when and if these aspects mature by progressed or regressed directions in the Secondary directional system.

A second purpose of this book is to demonstrate that the methods described in my books, *Prediction* 1, 11, 111 and in *Political Astrology*, are not only occasionally valid and do not require specially selected horoscopes, but are effective with any properly rectified radix.

I wish to express my gratitude to all those astrologers who have shown an understanding for my endeavours and who promoted my research by publishing my articles and books. My personal contact with memorable astrologers like *C.E.O. Carter, Brigadier R.C. Firebrace, Cyril Fagan , Vendel Polich, A.P. Nelson Page , Ronald Davison, John Addey* and others, has enabled me to analyze their radices with their full consent.

I wish to thank *Ken Gillman* and *Axel Harvey*; who not only published my articles during a decisive period in my research (memorable editions of their *"Considerations"*, 1984 - 1989),but also corrected my English, grammar and syntax, and provided some fruitful suggestions for the publication of this book.

## Rules and Assumptions in Advanced Astrology 1990

The precondition for any serious astrological work is the determination of the true birth time. So far the best tools for this are precessional (side-real) Lunar Returns.

(Prediction I using Common and Prenatal Cycles, pages 39 – 51)

If the number of available events is limited, the additional use of prenatal Lunars is indispensable.

The character of the event as well as the psychological experience of the native are denoted by the angularity of appropriate planets. In other words, you will not find planets which do not suit the nature of the event on any angle of the different precessed Lunars. As the operational periods of the different precessed Lunars vary, a precondition for their analysis (and also for prediction) is the use of the *Overlap Method*.

(Prediction I using Common and Prenatal Cycles, p. 90)

Depending on the number of events and Lunars that are analyzed, it is possible to identify the birth time within a few minutes of time, the equivalent of one to two degrees of RAMC. Natal charts secured in this way can be analyzed, utilizing all tools presented in Prediction I.

To arrive at a more precise result, the ASC-Lunar (the lunar return of the Conception horoscope) may be used. (Prediction III, p. 31 -51)

The most reliable method, however, easier to handle and more reliable than a rectification with the ASC-Lunar, is an analysis with Primary Directions in the Topocentric System. The validity of a rectification with Primary Directions depends on the following:

1. The orbs of the directions should not exceed

a) 10° of arc for conjunctions and oppositions

b) 5' of arc for the other effective aspects (trine, square, semisquare, sesquiquadrate, sextile, semisextile and quincunx). All other aspects should be ignored.

- 2. Initially the rectification should be performed with angular directions. The angles are directed, both direct and converse, to radical planets.
- 3. After a few angular directions with the appropriate symbolism have been found, all pointing to the same radical RAMC, an analysis with directed house cups should confirm this assumed RAMC.
- 4. The final proof of the result will then be interplanetary directions and planetary directions to angles and house cusps.

A proposed rectification can be classified in one of four ways: a) The result is excellent and there is no doubt about its correctness. This should be the case if a large number of events is available. b) The result is still convincing

c) The result is doubtful

d) The result is definitely wrong.\*

#### \*If there are:

1. Not enough angular and house cusp directions for main events.

2. The orbs of the directions are in many cases too large.

3. A doubtful symbolism has been used.

The rectified charts presented in this book should provide useful examples for those readers who wish to experiment with this advanced rectification method. Without exception, in well over 300 rectifications, no closefitting VIII cusp directions have been found for the death of the native himself. This has again and again backed up my claim that the VIIIth cusp symbolizes only the death of relatives and friends, sometimes connected with inheritances. Each cusp has a certain symbolic relation with its opposite cusp, such as: ASC= personal events; DESC.= partners, opponents. The lind cusp, which undoubtedly symbolizes money and property, could not possibly have an opposite cusp symbolizing the death of a native. Instead, the ASC and the IC afflicted preferably by malefics, are always characteristic of an individual's death.

While there have been no traces of the VIIIth cusp in connection with the native's death in Primary Directions, in cases where the native was the victim of a murder, transits and prenatal transits gave conclusive answers (John F. Kennedy).

Having studied astrological symbolism for over 40 years, I came to the conclusion that there are still two planets to be discovered. One for VIRGO (jobs, employees, rote method, compulsive precision), as the counterpart of PISCES and NEPTUNE ; the other for LIBRA (contracts, air and space travel, equilibrium overcoming the force of gravity) as a counterpart of ARIES and MARS.

The statements of the ancients giving the Luminaries one and the planets two signs are overruled by the fact that three new planets have been discovered since.

On the other hand, the true symbolism of planets and the tropical signs cannot possibly allow any planet to belong with a second sign.

For instance: SATURN is incompatible with AQUARIUS as well as with URANUS. JUPITER "the judge" has nothing in common with PISCES or NEPTUNE. MERCURY "the lawyer" has nothing in common with VIRGO. Furthermore the masculine planets become feminine, and vice versa, if one follows the traditional rules. CHIRON, carefully tested in rectified charts, does not produce any truly effective directions in the Primary as well as Secondary directional systems. The omission of two still undiscovered planets could be the reason for the lack of MDO congruencies, both for rule 3 and 3a, in about 20 percent of cases analyzed. So far, in over 60 cases, the coordinates of the birthplace have also been valid for the conception horoscope (prenatal epoch). This is also the case for President <u>Franklin D. Roosevelt</u>, of whom we know that conception should have occured when his parents were on a tour in France. Additional cases in which the place of residence during conception differed from that of the radix should give us the answer.

#### Conclusions

The basis of astrology's revolutionary development into a science consists of this: in any well handled horoscope, there is a chain of results which progressively multiply the factor counting against coincidence; one then attains near-certainty.

In the analysis of past events as well as forecasts, unections must be confirmed to the highest degree by precessed Lunars and Transits.

Some astrologers obviously err in their approach to astrology.

They regard astrology as an art, neglecting the fact that

a) Astrology ---if not mutilated and swollen by fictional factors which cannot be verified---is already a science in an empirical sense; for there never has been any doubt about the symbolism of the planets, the efficacy of angles, etc.

b) Astrology becomes a real science through measurements which in most cases obviate coincidence.

Astrology has been considered an art by some astrologers because no visible progress has been made in this science for centuries.

I agree, however, that up to the development of Primary directions in the Topocentric system, with the revolutionary finding of the Conception horoscope and the Dual-Test, it was not possible to verify the power of astrological directional factors.

This is already a first step towards cautious, modest prediction. As I have reiterated, forecasts of events are amply justified and are likely to succeed if not only the horoscope of the native, but also those of his relatives and friends, have been properly studied.

#### Valuable astrological systems with a solid astronomical background

The writer states with satisfaction that most of the principles of traditional astrology, at the higher level, can nowadays be regarded as confirmed.

One of the most important questions which have been raised by the writings of *Cyril Fagan* is:

Which of the two astronomical systems in natal and directional astrology is valid and which not - the sidereal or the tropical Zodiac ?

Extensive research indicates that astrologers have been on the right path, at least since the golden age of Greek science (around 400 B.C).

I believe the following should be valid without execeptions :

In all those cases where astronomically correct astrological systems are applied to the natal chart or to the conception horoscope, the positions and measurements of the traditional tropical Zodiac are valid.

This not only concerns transits and directions but, strangely enough, also precessional (sidereal) Solar Returns. Here directions in the secondary directional system, mainly conjunctions, prove the general law favouring the tropical Zodiac. Details for this special case will be found in

## Prediction I using Common and Prenatal Cycles , p. 23 - 38 , and Political Astrology , p. 32 - 34.

The writer does not doubt that for the delineation of a natal chart too the tropical Zodiac is valid. This is, of course, so far only an empirical statement, but it is based on the practice of traditional astrologers over centuries.

*Cyrll Fagan* found the origin of the zodiacal signs as known to the ancient Egyptians. This could be a serious matter, because it conflicts with undoubted research results obtained in old and modern times. On the other hand it could be that Old Egyptian astrology - in the writer's opinion considerably overrated - had its origin in cultures such as the Phoenician, Syrian or Babylonian, which may have established astrology on a tropical base.

It is very likely that the sidereal system, which is very exotic in comparison with the tropical System now in use, reflects mass catastrophies, where traditional rules for individuals do not work.

The few astrologers who are still trying the efficacy of the sidereal Zodiac in connection with natal charts would do better to work on mundane charts such as the Sidereal Capricorn Solars. This is likely to teach us how mass catastrophies are convincingly reflected in astrological maps.

The astrological systems demonstrated in *Prediction I using Common* and *Prenatal Cycles* are all valid to determine approximate birth times. For refined rectification, special methods and directional systems have to be used which are explained in *Prediction II*, and for the Dual Test\* in *Prediction III*.

The Solar-Arc method (in eclipto) is pure fiction; unfortunately it is still very much in use, as is the Uranian System based on non-existent hypothetic Trans-Neptunian planets.

As all planets discovered so far obviously have variable latitudes and the hypothetic planets have not, followers of this system, undergoing qualified criticism, had to change their name to that of the so-called "hypothetic sensitive points".

They mix these points and real planets to create five thousand Arabic points on the Zodiac. The result is interpretation with a clearly wrong symbolism and other defects which violate statistical laws of coincidence and defy logic (See : Prediction III, p. 92, *Fictions in Astrology*)

Another problem is the interpretation of transits and prenatal transits. Here books of some hundred pages, with detailed recipes for all planetary combinations and all major and minor aspects, are of no use because these recipes are more the product of phantasy than of serious research.

However, the writer warmly recommends *Reinhold Ebertin's Combi*nation of Stellar influences, which is so far the best tool for learning the symbolism of luminaries and planets, and how to predict that a day will be favourable or unfavourable. Of course the midpoint technique presented therein has to be used with caution and preferably in connection with rectified radices.

#### The Dual Test

developed by the writer in the early 80s and applied to most nativities in this book has to be regarded as a revolutionary discovery. It improves the Topocentric directional system considerably, and provides, even without any statistics, ample proof of the <u>scientific character of astrology</u>. In other words, the struggle to eliminate coincidence in rectification should come to an end if the newly-developed tools are handled properly.

By applying Rules 1,2,3 and 3a one progressively reduces the chance that a rectification is confirmed merely by coincidence.

The true rectification is the most difficult part of natal chart analysis. It is based

(a) on small orbs; 5 minutes of arc for all aspects , 10 minutes of arc for conjunctions and oppositions and

(b) the true symbolism of luminaries and planets.

In view of the characteristic directions for main events which rapidly accumulate when a chart is properly rectified and studied, ruler and dispositorship have to be neglected.

#### <u>RULE 1</u>

The Ascendant or Descendant of the radix should be identical in eclipto with the MOON of the Prenatal Epoch; the orb should not exceed a few minutes of arc. So far the average orb ( arithmetical mean) has been 2 ' of arc.

#### <u>AULE 2</u>

The MOON should be waxing or waning in both charts. We found exceptions in charts where the Moon was almost FULL or NEW .

#### <u>RULE 3</u>

In most cases there are congruencies in the Meridian distances in OA or OD (MD0's) between the radix and the Epoch.

#### RULE 3a

There are MDO congruencies between the native and his relatives (appendicul connections) and friends

#### JEAN BAPTISTE MORIN (1583-1656) A critical analysis of his theories with contemporary methods

Jean Baptiste Morin was undoubtedly the most famous astrologer of his time. He is said to have produced astonishingly accurate predictions. The writer has commented on this in Prediction I ( page 61). Whether Morin's skill has been overrated or not, nowadays we must ask ourselves if Morin's theories are still valid and, if so, to what extent ?

For this analysis the following sources were used :

I. The Theory of Astrological Determinations (in French) by H. Sylva.

2. The Astrological Synthesis (in German) by Schwickert and Weiss.

3.Primary Directions(in German) by Schwickert and Weiss.

*Friedrich Schwickert*, whose publications have also appeared in English, should be a well-known author at least to astrologers of the older generation.

These three books contain a thoughtful selection of Morin's astrolological work, Astrologia Gallica, which appeared in 26 volumes.

The first step of the present analysis consisted of a re-computation of those horoscopes used as examples by Morin that were accompanied by a sufficient number of events. These calculations were done to give a concrete answer to the following questions:

a) How exact were the positions of planets, coordinates, etc., at that time ?

b) What conclusions may be drawn from the given or determined birth<sup>\*</sup> times ?

With regard to Morin's own chart, we have to expect a certain accuracy and also the best possible interpretation of his radix: here we have to emphazise that considering the tools he had at that time -- such as only the old planets and very approximate planetary positions-- he really produced miracles.

There is no doubt that his own map is genuine, as it appears in all books mentioned above without any changes or corrections.

For the computation of the planets two very sophisticated computer programs were used independently. These not only gave similar results but show that they can match results that are achieved with programs on larger computers used by the different computer services. Some difficulties, arose in Morin's examples concerning the coordinates of the different birth places. He was born in Villefranche in the Rhone district. This town undoubtedly has the following coordinates : 45 N 59 ; 4 E 43.

The writer did not succeed in authenticating the East longitudes Morin used because of too many inaccuracies in the birth times. Morin used Northern latitude 45 N 25 for his own radix, which is in error by a considerable 34 of arc.

The original birth horoscope, Fig. 1, published in Astrologia Gallica shows that Morin was relying on certain tables, such as the Rudolphine. Needless to say, the resulting inaccuracies reflect the standard of astronomy of that time.

Originally the writer was surprised that the angles of Morin's solar returns are almost identical with those that the writer calculated, even though Morin used a position for the Sun which was much in error. The mystery was explained by the astrologer Kennet Gillman:


"The method of obtaining the angles of any solar return, as practiced among older astrologers, was to add annual increments of 5 hours, 48 minutes, 45 seconds of sidereal time to the birth sidereral time. The result is the sidereal time for the required solar return. By referring this return S.T. to the sidereal time at noon on the birthday anniversary, the time before or after noon for which the planets positions are to be calculated is also known. Obviously Morin first rectified his birth chart and then generated solar returns directly from this rectified figure."


The writer was in the very fortunate position to be able to rectify Morin's birth chart with Primary Directions which, in almost all cases, matured with an astonishing accuracy.


## RADIH AND EPOCH OF J.B. MORIN rectified with Primary Directions in the Topocentric system using the Dual-Test.





In Morin's radix Mars has to be regarded as the most life-destructive planet because:

 $1,\ It$  is the Ascendant Ruler, it is angular, being close to to the IC, and squares Pluto.

2. PLUTO in the XIIth house appears in the very significant Primary Direction: ASC conv square Pluto at death.

3. In the Prenatal Epoch Mars is square Neptune.

4. Obviously Morin's death was preceded by a lengthy illness or weakness. This is shown by Directions involving SATURN and also in the Prenatal Lunar which started operating 17 days before the death.

Death is shown by the Demi-Lunar with MARS,SATURN, URANUS and NEPTUNE on both sides of the MC and Ascendant. This started operating five days before death.

The rectification of Morin's radix with advanced methods shows that, despite considerable inaccuracies in the positions of the planets and coordinates in Morin's version, he achieved an almost exact RAMC.

(The difference between Morin's and the writer's result in RAMC 2' of arc). His computation of the Ascendant is accurate too. However, as said before, he used an inaccurate Northern Latitude,  $45 \times 25$  instead of  $45 \times 59$ .

#### A BRIEF ANALYSIS OF MORIN'S BIRTH CHART

Morin's illnesses resulted from the accumulation of planets in the XIIth shouse. The MOON-SATURN conjunction (a quite individual aspect because of the quick apparent motion of the Moon) is especially connected with weak and unbalanced health The very close semisquare of SATURN to the Ascendant (orb 22' of arc) is remarkable. It is characteristic of long-lasting illnesses and is, at the least, a permanent threat. The splendid SUN-JUPITER conjunction (orb 29') within one degree of Cusp XII gave some protection, as well as recovery from serious illnesses.

Morin's enormous productivity in writing is shown by the trine of the MOON to NEPTUNE (by tradition said to be in reception) and further by the sextile of MERCURY to the Ascendant (orb 15'). His scientific talents (and the people who promoted him) are reflected by the MERCURY-URANUS conjunction in the XIth house, and by the almost exact trine of URANUS to the IIIrd Cusp (Topocentric). SATURN, by tradition ruler of the MC and in harmonious sextile to it, may be regarded in this context as benevolent and as a supporter of Morin's career. His extraordinary intuition may be characterized by the JUPITER-URANUS conjunction in Aquarius in the Ist house of the Prenatal Epoch.

Extensive research has revealed that the statements of Morin about the so-called rulers of the Cusps I and VIII, and/or their dispositors, being always decisively involved in the death of a native are definitely wrong. The benefics VENUS and JUPITER may reflect certain illnesses, but life is always extinguished by the participation of malefics ( see directions, transits and cycles for Morin's death, above). Analogous to this, neither does Morin's ruler and dispositor theory work if applied to other matters with corresponding house cusps.

Here is an example: the direction MC trine SATURN (in the best possible celestial position without the interference of JUPITER), or SATURN trine MC, may reflect an honorable retirement, as it usually does, but never the receipt of medals or other honors. SATURN, ruler of the Vth Cusp, or on the Cusp itself, will never reflect the happy birth of a child, but will rather cause serious complications or delays in the birth process. This knowledge supersedes any complicated theories about the efficacy of rulership and the dispositing of planets, the latter having produced fictions and a long-lasting delay in the development of true, scientifically-oriented astrology. To a certain extent this also applies to the interpretation of a birth chart.

As the writer's demonstrations in Prediction I, II and III show, directions have to be interpreted simply by the true symbolism of the planets, with the angles and house cusps as significators. This makes the interpretation of directions simpler, abolishes complicated mediaeval aphorisms or recipes and consequently avoids fictions. The interpretation of Primary Directions is explained in Prediction II, pages 17 - 31. The question arises, why did Morin try to force benefics like VENUS and JUPITER into the process of death ? A simple answer to this is that two missing malefics, NEPTUNE and PLUTO, were not known at this time and he tried to replace them.

Four of the charts used by Morin in his Astrologia Gallica had been obviously very well timed and perhaps also adjusted, because the analysis revealed that three of them are correct within one degree of RAMC. The rectification of these charts has very encouraging directions for available events -- of which there is sometimes only one (death).

The chart of *Cardinal Richelieu*, who was the leading politician at the French Court of *Louis XIV*, might be of general interest.

Richelieu's chart has been rectified with the following directions for his death, December 4, 1642 :

Primary Directions to radical factors :

SUN d square IC; MARS d semisquare Ascendant; SUN c conjunct NEPTUNE; SATURN c semisquare JUPITER.

Secondary Directions to radical factors :

IC re square SUN; Ascendant re opposite MOON; MARS re conjunct MERCURY

Jean Baptiste Morin was without doubt a brilliant astrologer, although the legends about him might be-- as often happens -- exaggerated. He tried to erase all the (sometimes superstitious) aphorisms that had been introduced by his predecessors. His interpretations of the radices of important, history-making people are remarkable. His determinations about rulership and the detriment of planets are true as regards one Tropical sign for each body of our Solar System.

In this direction some progress has been made during the 20th Century because of three more planets having been found, and also because of faster and more accurate research.

The writer working now over 40 years on major astrological problems, and since 1963 with the aid of a large computer, has come to the following conclusions: an accurately timed and, as far as possible, rectified birth chart does not show the determinate, unavoidable destiny of a native.

To a certain extent, this (Morin's rule) may be applied to persons who have decisively influenced history. The maturing of bad aspects of malefics, and even of benefics in detriment, are mainly responsible for fatal events In the lives of the natives, and are sometimes accompanied by mundane events of world-wide importance.

Adolf Hitler has a most unfortunate combination of MARS in Taurus square SATURN in Leo in the Xth House which, by Morin's interpretation, is the most evil combination that a person can have. In fact, Hitler's fall was pre-programmed by Stalingrad (February 1943), the destruction of a complete, well-equipped German army) when SATURN by Secondary Direction reached the square to radical Mars

the exterminator of millions of Jews was sentenced to death and hanged in Israel (May 31, 1962) when Saturn had reached the square to radical Jupiter by regressed Secondary Direction.

His following radical positions may be of some interest here:

JUPITER 1º GEM 25'; Ascendant 8º GEM 41'

ALDEBARAN 8º Gem 27' 05"; SATURN 8º Pis 08'; URANUS 8º Cap 17'; NEPTUNE 7º CAN 36', Pluto 20º GEM 45'.

Interpretation by Morin's determination theories : SATURN square Ascendant (orb 33') may result in imprisonment, as SATURN is in a criminal sign, Pisces. As the ruler of the VIIIth Cusp, Saturn may even cause the death of the native.

In a similar case to the above Morin describes a maturing SATURN-JUPITER square by secondary progression as "death by jurisdiction". This is a remarkable hit indeed.

Very characteristic also is Morin's description of a prominent JUPITER, if in detriment in Gemini: " A benefic like JUPITER even in detriment, always gives a certain luck and success, but can turn out to be a fatal malefic if badly aspected by SATURN."

The writer's long experience with rectified radices of both prominent and ordinary persons allows the following interpretation of Eichmann's destiny: generally speaking, the radical Ascendant is badly afflicted here by a very close square of SATURN (33') and a close quincunx of URANUS (28').

URANUS is opposed by Neptune within 22' of arc.

The Ascendant itself is conjunct ALDEBARAN, a fixed star of a violent character. This is a very serious portent of a violent death and especially if, as in this case, we have to deal with a prominent person. Further, MOON, VENUS, MARS and JUPITER are in detriment. The square of SATURN to JUPITER is also of immense importance and, at its maturing, according to Morin's determinations, death within a period of two years on either side or exactness could have been expected. However a more precise date for the occurrence of an event can be ascertained through the limited duration of Primary Directions, Cycles and Transits.

Eichmann's execution is reflected by a noticeable number of unfortunate transits of malefics: PLUTO opposite SATURN r (34'), sextile NEPTUNE r (3') and trine URANUS r (40'). MARS is transiting his exact radical position, while the prenatal transit MARS (January 4, 1850) was exactly conjunct natal PLUTO.

As repeatedly stated in the writer's publications, the determination rules of Morin are only applicable in birth charts of prominent people. This is by experience and simple logic. The latter because the slow apparent motion of planets gives the same sign position (whether favourable or not) for millions of people in the world.

#### Main characteristics in the natal chart.

Roy Firebrace's undoubtedly happy life is characterized by angular Parans on the Descendant and a prominent fixed star with small Latitude on the Ascendant:

PELAGUS, 10° 50' 36° Capricorn, a pure benefic and within 23' of arc on the Ascendant, gives a natural instinct and a good judgement in dangerous situations. It protects against accidents and Illnesses. It is similar in nature to its mighty counterpart SIRIUS, 12° 33' 38° Cancer. The Descendant reached Sirius in mid June 1916 by precession. This is very close to the native's marriage, 1916, April 20. However, as even the most refined rectification does not guarantee an Ascendant exact within a few " of arc, we may say that this conjunction could have reflected one of the events during his successful war time, 1914 –1918. The following combination of Parans close to the Descendant is characteristic of the native's reputation, his gentlemanly behaviour , his harmonious family life, and his great tolerance toward those who presented other opinions.

For the "Marriage"(3) the regressed Node by Secondary Direction has reached the ecliptical position of the radical Descendant within seconds of arc. Here we get three other proofs for our methods and rules.

1. As usual the **Mean** Node is effective on the ecliptic and in a mundane way.

2. The Mean Node's symbolism " Relationship", and its distinguished position on the DESC is here undoubtedly the main factor for the marriage. 3. The exactness of this direction confirms that the slow moving planets have a very small orb, mainly because their apparent movement is very slow, and sometimes they are effective over years.

4. The exact maturation of this direction is a further proof of a refined, true rectification.

We can also observe three very close aspects in Oblique Ascension and Descension (topocentric) which have similar characteristics as Parans.

Brigadier Roy Firebrace was the Editor of SPICA, an astrological Journal which favoured Sidereal views and methods. Together with Mary Austin he produced a quarterly periodical (1961 - 1974) that was acknowledged as a journal of high standard.

His military career is characterized by SUN, MARS and SATURN in Leo and in the cardinal 7th House. His ability to learn foreign languages very quickly is symbolized by URANUS in the 9th House. The latter helped him in his brilliant military career, as he became a Military Attaché in Moscow.



Vendel Polich was not only an eminent astrologer but also an excellent mathematician. His book "<u>The Topocentric System</u>" is by far the most outstanding work I have ever seen in matters of <u>spherical trigonometry</u>, applied to astrology.

Fis demonstrations of the construction of the Topocentric System, its relationship and technical transfer to the sphere are fascinating.

Unfortunately his computations were made at a time when computing devices with trigonometric functions were unavailable. Thus there are some inaccuracies. His precisionistic demonstrations with split-minutes of arc cast doubt on some of his assumptions.





*Cyril Fagan* has to be regarded as one of the eminent astrologers of this century. In 1949, when he rediscovered the astrological principles of the ancient Babylonians and Egyptians, he initiated a new period of astrological research which was enthusiastically followed by a considerable number of astrologers who were willing and eager to break with tradition and to start again where research and practice seemed to have gone wrong. About the two Zodiacs the writer has commented above in his *"Rules and Principles in Advanced Practical Astrology"* 

All those astrologers who had the opportunity to collaborate with C.F. will agree that his Ascendant in <u>tropical</u> VIRGO is very characteristic of his character, his behavior and his appearance. He had nothing of a LEO nativity (sidereal). On some occasions he also developed precisionistic qualities.

His prominent SUN on the MC in <u>tropical</u> GEMINI characterized his Mercurial intellect rather than a Taurus personality. His job as a Civil Servant in the Irish Patent Office is also explained by the accumulation of planets in tropical Gemini and a Virgo Ascendant. Fagan had an excellent understanding of the true symbolism of the Luminaries and Planets. This enabled him with mainly sidereal (precessed) Lunars to trace and to work out approximate birthtimes.

### Cyril Fagan

### by Brigadier R.C Firebrace

An extract from an obituary in The Astrological Journal, Spring 1970.

I was deeply grieved that my old friend, Cyril Fagan, died on 5 January 1970 of a heart attack. It was under his instructions that I became interested in the sidereal zodiac for which I will be eternally grateful. He began his astrological career at the age of 20 in 1916 and made a thorough study of all astrological techniques. Few astrologers have been better equipped by a deep study of the astrology of the masters. Indeed It was impossible to find an astrological topic which he had not discussed and often argued about with the leading astrologers of the time.

He had the great advantage of being a first-class mathematician to whom calculations came easily. His later study of Egyptology fitted him for the study of ancient horoscopes and this led to his rediscovery of the ancient sidereal zodiac. As he had written to me he had become dissatisfied with the tropical zodiac and was seeking something better.

He began his Egyptological study in the middle 30's and found that the most ancient horoscopes were all in the sideraal zodiac. During the course of his research he calculated a map for a New Moon in 786 B.C and found that in this map all planets were in their degrees of exaitation either in longitude or in heliacal rising. It was from this discovery that he calculated the ayanasma (the distance between the two zodiacs) for that date. Statistical research has moved this figure by only six minutes and this is the ayanasma which we sidereallists use today.

Few had the knowledge to argue successfully with him. He was a kindly man who gave freely of his time in helping students of the sidereal. He wrote easily and fluently with a style which was all his own.

His first book entitled *Zodiacs Old and New* was published in 1951. This work is to be supplemented by a new book dealing in fuller detail with his astrological discoveries which will be called *Astrological Origins*. This book is to be issued by Llewellyn's of America in March of this year(1970).

He had made the decision to use the Octopian house system invented by *imhotap*, an eightfold house division of the heavens running clockwise as opposed to all other systems which are twelve-fold and run counter clockwise. He had previously been a staunch supporter of the *Campanian system*.

One of his latest statements was that he had discovered that PLUTO is the planet, besides others, of loneliness. He had it on the midheaven and I think that he was to some extend a lonely man. In this he was not helped by a serious deafness which tended to cut him off from others. But he was supreme on paper; this was his real love.

Sidereal astrology has begun to make an impact on astrological thought in America where some schools devoted to its study have been opened. It has not made much impact on thought in Europe or England. It remains for those, like myself, who believe in the sidereal zodiac, to continue their studies and carry on the work of Cyril Fagan, the father of modern sidereal astrology. By us he will be sadly missed as he was the source of our inspiration.

Extracts from a letter of *Cyril Fagan*, dated September 19, 1962, on occasion of his sister's death and an inheritance which was avaiting him.

• August 23, at 5.25 p.m. GST I received a telegram to say my sister had died unexpectedly and on August 25, after the funeral the solicitor informed me that as the result of my mother's will my brother and I would benefit by my sister's death. This came as a great shock, as I was always under the impression that my mother's money would be left in trust in perpetuity.

As an astrologer you know that the finest direction one could have is:

\* MC progr. conjunction JUPITER rad

When I took up astrology I noted that this direction would operate in my horoscope when I was over 60 years of age.

The SLR and the Demi (Aug 5 and Aug 18) are showing Pluto in opp to Jupiter on MC - IC and vice versa.

Carl Kuehr was a very intelligent man, quick-witted and sarcastic= MERCURY in Aries sextile MC semisextile ASC .

As a result of his astrological studies he believed in predestination.


He was very musical and played the plano quite well = VENUS sext NEPTUNE (angular on MC)

SATURN angular in both the Radix and Epoch reflected several illnesses and a chronical Asthma (Saturn opposing Neptune in Gemini). Besides this he suffered from loneliness and occasional depressions.

Around the start of this century, several well-known astrologers, Zadkiel, Sepharial and others, experimented with Primary Directions using too-large orbs, doubtful symbolism and, as the writer has found, frequently unauthenticated birth times. It was Kuehr who was the first astrologer to produce rectifications that are acknowledged nowadays.


He used the Naibod-key for Primary Directions, directing the Angles and planets using the Placidian Domification System. While the directions of planets turned out to be either too inaccurate or false, his angular directions are identical with those used by Nelson Page and Vendel Polich in their Topocentric System.

His book "*Berechnung der Ereigniszeiten, 1936*" (Computation of Time Periods for Happenings), now out of print, was mastered only by very few astrologers. Besides his rectification method, the book contained a very well conceived demonstration of the three astronomical bases used in astrology -- the Equator, the Ascendant and the Ecliptic (Zodiac).





*Elsbeth Ebertin*, a distinguished astrologer, with her son Reinhold and a research group, developed a Midpoint System which in contrast to its originator *Alfred Witte* was almost free of all the superflous factors which Witte had introduced with the fictional Hypothetic Transneptunian Planets. (See, Prediction III, page 92)


Ebertin's book "Kombination der Gestirnseinflüsse" (Combination of Stellar Influences) distinguishes itself by its clear interpretation of the planets and a correct symbolism

Unfortunately this Midpoint technique is only useful when applied in the Transit system and, to a certain extent, in the interpretation of natal charts.(Here it should be mainly applied *in mundo* in connection with the angles and, of course, in rectified horoscopes). The Symbolic Arc (Solar arc in eclipto) in Secondary Directions is however completely wrong. These Midpoints are frequently misused, for they overload the horoscopes with an uncontrolled, superflous number of factors. This is especially dangerous if the birthtime has not been properly authenticated.



*Hargaret Millard* was one of the few astrologers who early recognized the discovery of A.P. Nelson Page and Vendel Polich and its development since 1963. She has specialized on inherited MDO congruencies and wrote a book about it "*The Genetics of Astrology*" The following paragraphs about Margaret Millard's life and views are taken from this book :

"Dr. Margaret Millard, a retired medical doctor, astrologer and the author of "*Casenotes of a Medical Astrologer*", has always lived on the crack between two worlds-- science and the other world of mystery which lies beneath all forms. She finally turned from science to the other world, studying theatre for four years to earn a degree.

Theatre has everything, says Dr. Millard. " It has spectacle, poetry, music and dance It has philosophy, history and literature. It helps one understand the subtext of life, the meaning behind events. The world of the unconscious dark forces has been given no place in our society. It has revenged itself by erupting into crime and drugs. Dionysius will not be denied. They say that Anaxagoras the philosopher was once asked why anyone should choose to be born. For the sake of contemplating the universe, 'he said, and the order governing its parts."

Like Anaxagoras the author has found delight in contemplating the order of Universe.



### Main Characteristics of Nelson Page's Radix :

His talent for pure science could hardly be better symbolized than by URANUS on the MC accompanied by the Sun and Mercury ( the planet of the pure intellect). JUPITER on the Ascendant guaranteed full support to all his aims and endeavours in astrology. Needless to say this combination also supported his profession as chief mathematician and statistician in an insurance company. It is further remarkable that he started from scratch without any degrees. His harmonious domestic life is symbolized by the MOON close to the Descendant, in an ecliptical sextile to the SUN and in a mundane opposition to JUPITER. Mighty SUN, high in the sky and in an exact ecliptical trine to JUPITER, may be regarded as one of the main indications of his single-minded even in illness, and his successful

The position of SATURN within a few minutes of arc from the IC is very unfortunate. Close angular conjunctions like this, may affect all spheres of life, for they are in mundane opposition and square to all angles of the horoscope. This is so mainly if, as here, Saturn is not supported by ecliptical conjunctions or mundane Parans preferably by SUN or JUPITER. The main misfortune that we know about was his severe illness (lung cancer) followed by his early death, and the fact that his findings did not find the necessary support during his life time. However, Saturn neither damaged his career nor his advances in astrology, because the mighty group of SUN,MERCURY and URANUS high in the sky, together with JUPITER on the Ascendant, were elevated over this malefic.

As was mentioned earlier, SATURN, even when in its best positions and harmoniously aspected, will always bring delays and, as here, it may prevent the native from having a visible and world-wide recognition.

PLUTO on the Ascendant in close opposition to the MOON may be involved in his fatal illness; Pluto is very often involved in cancer.

There is another characteristic of Nelson Page's PLUTO on the Ascendant, one that I have noticed in other nativities. He often tried to support his mathematical results with a superflous number of exclamation marks. Another example of this was the astrologer *E. H. Troinski*, who in addition to his exclamation marks also tried to produce sensations. NEPTUNE the " anti-science " planet is here fortunately in an unimportant place.

As a schoolboy, Nelson Page came to Buenos Aires when his parents emigrated to the Argentine. After a commercial education, he went into business at the age of 18. At this time, he became interested in astrology. With all of the seriousness that we can expect from a man with such a scientific mind, he improved his knowledge in mathematics and achieved a solid command of astrology.

These extensive studies, with the emphasis on mathematics and statistics, greatly helped his outstanding career. In later years, up to his death, he held a highly responsible position in an insurance company. He married at 25 and had three children, His eldest son, himself a serious astrologer, attained a degree as a nuclear physicist.

Nelson Page's salient importance lies in the fact that he recognized, and subsequently publicized, the actual basis of serious astrological research -- the scientifically provable rectification.

Together with his friend Vendel Polich (his collaborator for over twenty years) he solved many of the trigonometrical problems of astrology and discovered the Topocentric House System retrospectively, that is via events on narrowly-timed births.

Further achievements of his contemporary scientific astrology are the ascensional transits (Meridian distances in OA and OD).

Tony, admired and loved by his friends, died after long sufferings at the age of 51, on March 1, 1970 in Buenos Aires. The full recognition of his and his friend V. Polich's discoveries must however await later generations.

### The Writer's Autobiography

I was born in Zürich, Switzerland on April 12, 1919. The hospital records give the time as 13h 30m MET = 12h 30m U.T.

In the hospital my mother made the acquaintance of a woman who practiced astrology. She was told that at the time of my birth MARS was high in the sky. This inspired my mother to give me the names Alexander Victor.

The final rectification gave April 12, 1919, 12h 11m 14 s U.T.

Coordinates (hospital) : 47º N 22' 57" ; 8º E 33

The Epoch resulted in: July 10, 1918, 18h 38m 51s U.T.

As far as I know conception took place in Zurich. I used the same coordinates as for the birth; these fit reasonably well.

### A brief resume of my life

My mother was born in Johannesburg, S.A. on January 6, 1897; ASC Libra. She died at the age of 72 (stroke on July 15, death on July 31, 1969).

My father, Wladimir (Waldemar), was born in Kiev, Ukraine on June 22, 1884; ASC Leo with Jupiter rising. He died at the age of 87 in his sleep on May 15, 1972. It is remarkable that he had no severe illness or any surgical operation. His costly hobby was breeding Pointers and Setters, for which he was well-known in England and elsewhere.

My parents moved to Berlin when I was about one year old. They separated in October 1923.<sup>1</sup>

Although I was only four years old, I clearly remember that I had a very bad time and suffered very much. I lived thereafter with my father and the loss of my mother caused me psychological problems.

At an early age I was fascinated with music. My father frequently took me to brass band concerts in the Berlin Zoo and also to the famous Café Vaterland, where I would listen attentively, especially to the leading violinist. I received my first piano lessons at age five. My father soon found out that I have perfect pitch, and I began violin lessons the following year.

My father, who was the general representative of firms selling machine tools, often had to travel abroad, especially to Soviet Russia. He therefore engaged a governess for me. This was very fortunate, as I came to feel to a certain extent that she replaced my mother.

She was a well-educated Russian emigré, a victim of the Soviet revolution in 1917. She sang very well and was also able to accompany me on the piano, which made my first steps with the violin more interesting. At this time we all - my father, my governess and myself - used to speak Russian, a language that was to be very helpful to me in my later life and which I have preserved until today.

My progress with the violin was promising but not too exciting. By the time I was ten years old I participated in school concerts and at fourteen, as the result of a competition, I was chosen to play a sonata by Veracini before an audience of more than a thousand in the main studio of Berlin Broadcast.

But my father did not intend that I should become a professional violinist and this, together with circumstances, connected with high school, sports and other hobbies, prevented me from pursuing the art of the violin more intensively. Hence the most fruitful years for any active violinist, those between ten and sixteen, passed: and the result was a violinist who played reasonably well but with no qualifications to be a "wonder child" or a notable soloist. My position in the secondary school, which German children attend from age ten to nineteen, was satisfactory. I was among the best in class during the first years but later I dropped down to a more medium level. This was mainly the result of not doing homework, with the stress of copying homework before the start of the lessons. My class reports showed excellent and good notes in mathematics, French, music, biology and sports. The general summary in most of my reports: "equally interested in all subjects."

My life as a schoolboy was accompanied by much psychological frustration and suffering. My father's liaison with the young woman who was my violin teacher, lasting for six years, brought about serious troubles. She lived permanently in our house and I often felt completely isolated and neglected by my father. *Maria Neuss*, aged 23, was a very talented violinist who was regarded as one of the best German violin players. Unfortunately she did not have the necessary psychological understanding of a child; nor, of course, did she have any time for me, being anxious about her own career as an artist.

It was Maria's interference that lost me my governess. I was then aged nine. From then on I was practically always on my own with my thoughts and problems.

By the time I had started secondary school my father was treating me as an adult. This caused me to become completely self-reliant and to develop some sort of resistance against my father. The result was psychological strength and ambition (SUN,MERCURY,MARS) but also some complexes (SATURN). These psychological circumstances combined together to stimulate early maturity and puberty. Already from the age of fourteen I was attracted by the fair sex and had permanent girl friends. This, of course, without any sexual activity which in those days was taboo for teenagers. I was also very fond of dancing. Not being under permanent control, I used to attend fancy dress balls in the costume of a Sicilian fisherman.

I graduated on March 12, 1937 <sup>2</sup> and immediately (on April 4) had to begin my labour service <sup>3</sup>, which brought me to Silesia near the now Polish town of Sagan. At the start I lived in comparatively primitive barracks with fourteen people in a room. Each of us had only a small locker in which it was difficult to arrange all of one's equipment, not to mention personal belongings. The food was bad and the hard labour tiring and depressing. We had to cultivate heathland. We had each been given a heavy pickaxe. Each worker achieved results depending on his own talents, his strength and the job he had previously. I had no talent for this work and fell below the minimum. By contrast peasants mastered everything with ease. In later years I found parallels with this fortunately very short period of my life in the novel of *Solzhenitzyn, "One day in the life of Ivan Denisowich (in a Russian forced-labour camp.*)

During the first days of my stay in this camp I had the opportunity to distinguish myself in a sporting competition, where together with another student I became joint first of 120, with results I never had achieved before. The 100 metres I mastered under 12 seconds and threw the shot put over 10 metres.

Unfortunately, being six feet one inch in height, on the first day of my arrival in this camp I was chosen for the annual "Führer Parade" in Nuremberg. This would have meant more drill and stress.

All this happened within the first days. On Sunday April 11, one day before my eighteenth birthday, I met a musician who was in the band of the labour service district. When he heard that I played the violin and the clarinet, he promised to speak with the band leader about a transfer for me.

Sooner than I had expected I was called to audition. I had some trouble demonstrating my clarinet playing and only was able to play a C (B) major scale. My violin playing apparently greatly impressed the "Gruppen Musik-leiter" and I was accepted. The commanding officer of the labour camp took special care to equip me with a completely new outfit<sup>4</sup>. At the end of April I joined the band<sup>4</sup>. What a contrast and a release !

At the end of April I joined the band <sup>4</sup>. What a contrast and a release ! Our band was completely on its own in an old saw-mill, a little outside of Sagan (Silesia). It was really a comfortable, quite lazy living. Three hours of rehearsals, two hours of single exercises, then for me, with the lowest rank of "Arbeitsmann" (labour man), a little bit of cleaning the barracks. On weekends I used to play light and dance music as a band leader in Sagan and in the surrounding villages. On Mondays, our free day, I sometimes tra-velled home to Berlin by express train as the railway station was only some hundred yards away from our barracks.

I was able to afford this luxury and other comforts as well, because my private income as a violinist was enough for my needs. A few weeks before the end of my labour service the music band was dissolved and I had to work very hard as a harvest volunteer on a farm. I was discharged on November 1<sup>5</sup>. After a break of only ten days I was

Originally I tried to start my two years military service in an infantry regiment stationed near my home in Berlin. However, on the advice of a friend of my father, I joined the famous regiment of guards in Berlin named after the Minister of War, General Hermann Goering.

This was no longer a regiment but already rather a division with many different branches, such as an elite cavalry squadron consisting of only fifty people which I was able to join by recommendation. I soon found out this was a great mistake, because the physical demands exceeded the strength of an 18-year-old youngster. Our duty began at 5:30 in the mor-ning and ended with theoretical instructions at eight at night. Most of the other new volunteers were already experienced in the treatment and riding of horses. Some complexes naturally crept in and worsened the situation. Only in infantry exercises, in sport, including shooting, and especially in the theoretical training was I able to challenge the farmers.

When the other sections of this so-called regiment ended their weekly service at noon on Saturday, the young volunteers of the cavalry squad, including myself, had to clean the rooms and stables. We sometimes worked until six in the evening. But this was not all.

Our leave finished at 2 Sunday morning yet the recruits of the other sections had a continuous leave until Sunday night. Every Sunday morning, from seven-thirty on, I had to groom two horses, leaving the barracks for a short break at noon

No wonder that on the 13th of January 1938, after an unassuming birthday celebration for our patron *Hermann Goering*, I became sick with jaundice<sup>7</sup>. This caused a welcome break for a fortnight in a very comfortable military hospital.

I was certainly not willing to handle this horse business for the rest of my two years military service. Here my music helped again. A very fortunate audition for the monstrous music band of the regiment, consisting of sixty-five members, allowed me to leave the cavalry squad at the end of February 1938 <sup>8</sup>.

By March 12 i was on the way to Austria with some units of the regiment. We were to take part in the infamous *Anschluss*. At a Hitler Parade in Vienna in March, where our band played, *Adolf Hitler* solemnly declared that there would be no more territorial claims against any European country. At the time this impressed me very much, because it would mean that we need not expect more international trouble from Hitler's lust for power. As we all know, Hitler broke this promise in September 1938 when the German armies ocupied parts of Czechoslovakia.

My time with the brass band was not at all successful. I occasionally had to entertain the officers and their wives with light and dance music at balls and other festivities, leading a band of twelve musicians.

My clarinet playing did not improve, because I did not practice. For this reason I did not have a good reputation with the "Stabsmusikmeister" (military band leader). On the other hand he knew that I would only stay for another year in the band, because I was not one of the professional soldiers who served for at least twelve years. Fate knew otherwise. I was transferred<sup>10</sup> on the 1st of November 1938 to an airforce unit where they badly needed a leading violinist. As a consolation I was promoted to corporal.

Earlier, in May of the same year, I had fallen in love <sup>9</sup> with the 17-yearold daughter of our sergeant major and deputy band leader. Here things went very well as the deputy, by the way an excellent clarinet player, was very fond of me and had no objections to our liaison. This lasted for almost two years. I had my first sexual experiences with this very pretty girl in 1938.

My new garrison was an anti-aircraft unit in Mecklenburg, a province in the north of Germany. There I had the opportunity to develop my abilities as a violinist. Our military band master was a devotee of string music. His name was *NOTE* (note in German and English). Here we may say *"Normen est omen"*. His original ambition had been to become the conductor of an operetta orchestra. He had not succeeded in this, but as a military band leader he tried to cultivate more string music. At rehearsals we usually prepared concerts of easy symphonies, opera and operetta music while the true function of a military band, the brass music, was neglected.

Concert tours for the band as a light orchestra were arranged in autumn and winter to many places. This took place under the slogan "*Winterhilfskonzerte*" which translated means, concerts in winter for the benefit of the poor and unemployed. In towns we produced concerts of light music, while in villages, after the official concert, there was dancing until late in the night. As we were lucky enough to have plenty of good musicians, this dance music was performed by several groups in rotation, giving the musicians a chance to participate in the dancing. I also used to lead a group of four to eight musicians in cafés at the seaside resort, "*Kuehlungsborn*" in Mecklenburg, now playing the violin as well as the saxophone.

Although I was rarely able to travel home to Berlin, I was quite happy with my military service at this time. I was financially independent, even though the pay of a rank and file soldier was very poor. Indeed, the large amount of extra income earned by most of the musicians also caused some jealousy among the other soldiers who where living in the same barracks.

Here it should be explained that the English expression "barracks" for the buildings where German soldiers were accomodated at the time does not suit reality at all.

One of the few useful acts of *Adolf Hitler's* was to create dwellings for military personnel which were like comfortable hospitals. This was especially so for buildings of the *Luftwaffe*. There were never rooms where more than four rank and file soldiers were accomodated. Each sergeant had a room for himself. All the other comforts, such as dining halls, swimming pools and sanitary arrangements, were exemplary compared to the accomodations of other European military personnel at that time.

From my stay at that garrison (November 1938 - May 1941) I remember one very unpleasant incident<sup>11</sup> during <u>Christmas 1939</u>. On that day I was ordered to play dance music with my band at a little nearby village inhabited by rather backward people. At the village inn one of our sergeants had played primitive country reels and other oldies for months. I had to replace him because he was ill, Naturally I was not prepared for this sort of dance music and soon the tipsy peasants began to complain.

One middle-aged man came up to me during an interval and told me in his dialect, which I could hardly understand "*You don't play the pieces we are looking for*". I could see by his behaviour that he was completely drunk. I don't remember my reply, but about a minute later he tried to attack me with a chair. It was no major accomplishment to knock out this drunk with some well-aimed blows to his chin.

When the son saw his father lying on the floor he came to his assistance and another fight began. The son, obviously with the same habits as his father, was also drunk. I was able to hold him down with a firm grip, not intending to harm him any further. Then friends of this young man and many others in the crowd came to his assistance, and a real fight began. Naturally I was unable to hold my own against such odds.

Fortunately two brave comrades and two soldiers in uniform came to my assistance. I was able to escape through a back door without any injury other than a slightly swollen face. Music and dancing came to an end. The next day I submitted a written report of this incident to my superiors. The young man who started the fight by coming to his father's rescue, originally classified as an indispensable factory worker, was immediately called to arms.

The war became more evident as France was overrun and occupied. I continued to serve well protected behind the scene at the same place with the same tasks.


As I would not agree to bind myself for twelve years in order to become a professional soldier and with this to become a sergeant, I decided to request a transfer. It was very depressing indeed to see soldiers who had signed for twelve years become promoted, while I myself still remained a corporal with fewer privileges. It was also very likely that the music band would be dissolved and, I must frankly admit, I was not prepared to die or to be crippled for Hitler's madness.

My perfect knowledge of the Russian language helped me to realize my aims. When I was on leave in Berlin a friend of my father in the "Reichsluftfahrtministerium" (Ministry of Aviation) organized examinations for me in French and Russian. I failed the French, there having obviously been enough candidates, while the examination in Russian consisted of only a short interview.

Almost a full year passed before I was suddenly informed that I was to be transferred to an interpreter unit of the *Luftwaffe* in May  $1941^{13a}$ .

My new garrison was near Potsdam, the former residence of the Prussian kings, only half an hour away from my home in Berlin. I was soon able to arrange to live in my father's flat and to go daily to work at office times. In the severe circumstances of war time in Germany, my working hours from nine in the morning until five o'clock in the afternoon were unusually moderate. At first I had a very dull job. It consisted of locating and extracting important points such as villages, bridges, mills etc. with coordinates from original Russian staff maps.

Later, after a second short examination, I was tranferred to the deciphering department. This job attracted me much more, not least because I became quite successful at it. At the start the deciphering tasks I was given were comparatively simple tables, ten by ten = hundred positions. The ciphers were given in two digits. These tables which still exist in a similar form in some countries are constant in their basic structure and have to be encoded daily with new numerical series. An English sample of this type illustrates the following tables. 2 + 5 + 6 + 8 + 9 + 0 + 4 + 3 + 7



These tables are encoded daily by changing numerical rows and columns. In my example they are as follows:

Hor: 2156890437Vert: 4851790632The letter A will be 24; T = 12; Semicolon = 53, etc.

This primitive method of cipher is very easy to decipher, whether the underlying structure of the table is known or not. It is always more a matter of speed, i.e. to crack it in the shortest possible time. The international name for this cypher is *CESAR*, after the one who is said to have first used this form of covert communication.

Two days before the invasion of Russia our unit belonging to the *ObdL*, Oberkommando der Luftwaffe (High Command of the Airforce, Headquarters), was transferred by air to the region of *Johannesburg*, East Prussia<sup>136</sup>, where we lived in a youth hostel right on the shore of a beautiful large lake. When the war with Russia began we first had a very tiring and stressful time, working 12 hours a day in six-hour shifts. Huge quantities of Russian wireless messages were being picked up, evidence of anxiety and desperation. Even those who, like myself, didn't believe in Hitler's final victory came to the conclusion that Russian resistance could only last at best for a couple of weeks. By then about eight thousand planes and three Russian armies had been almost destroyed. August 1, 1941, 1 became a sergeant  $^{14}$ , a memorable day, because it was the only time in my life that I got completely drunk. A make-shift canteen had been erected, actually only a board fixed between two trees.

I invited my comrades in separate groups to hard drinks. With each group I took at least one "Korn", a schnaps made from wheat. I must have had a good dozen altogether. Still I was quite firm on my feet. However when the actual fete began I took one beer, threw up and after that went to bed. The party continued without my participation.

In September 1941 we were relocated to Goldap, another town in East Prussia. Here the barracks were similar to those in which I had lived during my obligatory labour service in 1937. Together with another sergeant I decided to try to get a private room in the town. We were quite lucky and soon found a midwife who rented us a quite comfortable room. We were working three shifts and it was a great relief not to live with twelve people in the barracks, where we would have been disturbed by the coming and going of sergeants on their different shifts. Just how lucky we were I found out one night, when we had to spend one uncomfortable night in the barracks.

This was thanks to our sergeant major, who warned us that on this special night there would be a sudden inspection. We were forbidden to be outside the garrison after midnight. Besides this we could have expected a penalty and would have been deprived of our comfortable living.

In mid-January 1942, nothing happened on the eastern front. We returned to our original quarters in Potsdam. Now we only worked regular daily hours, no shifts, and I received an allowance to live at home in Berlin again.

In May of the same year we again moved to the Eastern front, this time to the Ukraine near a small town called *Shitomir*.

Here I remember an accident and an unpleasant incident. While hunting rabbits and hares in the local woods and fields, the lock of my rifle went loose at a shot and I got some little pieces of exploded gun powder in my right eye<sup>15</sup>. The next morning I had a swollen eye and felt pain. It was fortunate that our medical officer was an eye specialist in his private life. In a quite short operation equipped with the necessary instruments, he removed all the particles from the eyeball and there have been no further complications.

The unpleasant incident occurred in the officers' club. Although I was not an officer, a comrade and myself were invited to a party. This was to honour our continuous success in deciphering, which also brought some personal commendations from the high command. i was talking in the kitchen of the club with a friend of mine, a lieutenant who was often aggressive if drunk, when a Slovak officer entered the room. My friend the lieutenant began to insult the Slovakian army. The Slovak, obviously drunk too, seized a bottle in order to attack my friend, who made a move towards him but stumbled and fell on the floor. I succeeded in putting the Slovak on his shoulder when one of our captains entered the room. I was immediately ordered out. The next morning I explained what had happened but one year later I stated that the whole incident had been misunderstood to my disadvantage.

In October 1942 I was promoted to warrant officer<sup>16a</sup> and a few weeks later we moved to Warsaw, the capital of occupied Poland.<sup>16b</sup> Here I met some relatives of mine, the female cousin of my father, her daughter and granddaughter. In Warsaw we stayed for two years, until the Polish uprising in August1944. At that time a full Soviet Russian army had advanced to the suburbs of Warsaw and, of course, the Polish population expected to be assisted by the Russians in liberating their capital. However the Soviets didn't move and the uprising was suppressed with much bloodshed.

During my stay in Warsaw I succeeded in getting a leave for studies<sup>17</sup>, an allowance given from the Reich to all soldiers who had been serving for more than five years. This only concerned soldiers who wished to become engineers or physicists.

I received the joyful message having just returned from a 14-day leave. Already one week later, in the second decade of November 1943, I was on the way to Berlin again. My studies at the Technical University, however, developed quite differently from what I had expected.

On November 22, 1943 there was a terrible air raid on Berlin by the RAF. A large part of West Berlin was destroyed, mainly the Wilmersdorf, Charlottenburg and Schoeneberg districts

This time our house in Charlottenburg was spared. I will never forget the scene at the burning elephant house in the Berlin Zoo. An elephant outside the house again and again approached the fire looking for his partner, who was perishing in the flames. This I observed shortly after the raid when we walked through the burning city looking for friends who lived in the same district.

When we arrived at my mother's home, we found a totally burned-out street, with a tram lying upside down in the street. There was no sign of my mother for a full two days, and I was very anxious. Fortunately, although she had lost all her property, she was unhurt, and had taken refuge in Zehlendorf, a suburb of Berlin.

The Technical University was also severely damaged and in the days after the raid students and faculty tried to repair some of the damage. A few days after the raid we had a written examination in differential and integral calculus. About thirty of us had to sit this test in a room without windows in freezing temperature. We each had a Bunsen burner with a small flame to warm up our frozen fingers.

Studying in those days was very difficult. There were almost no books for the students, and much of that what the professors taught was not entirely understood. This especially concerned all matters in physics, while in mathematics most of us came along quite well, because there had been regular exercises and written examinations.

There were continuous air raids for the five months I stayed in Berlin. On February 22, 1944, our house, *Xantener Strasse*, near the Olivaer Place was severely damaged. That night my escape from death was <u>surely mira-</u>culous (radical Sirius rising).

Shortly after the raid I was standing on the roof of our four-storey house wearing a gas mask. Other tenants were passing me buckets filled with water to moisten the roofing felt. Our intent was to prevent the fire from jumping from the neighbouring house over to our roof.

Suddenly I made a wrong step and fell down the steep roof. As I fell, I realized that to fall from a four-storey building was certain death. Simultaneously my whole life from age three to the present flashed through my brain. Fortunately, some of the roof's tiles were missing, blown off during this bombing, and I was able to stop my fall by grabbing on to an exposed rafter.

In mid-March 1944 ) had to return to my garrison in Warsaw; there I was  $\times$  told by phone that my father's dwelling had been completely destroyed.

Fortunately he was unhurt, but all of our property except the clothes he was wearing were destroyed. This loss of our possessions was in part due to my father's natural optimism (Jupiter rad ascending in Leo). He had decided that living outside of Berlin in a suburb we would not be further troubled by air raids. He had failed to move any of our valued posessions into the cellar.

All the things which never could be replaced, such as my huge collection of photographs, movies I had produced during the war, and a valuable stamp collection with almost-complete German, Russian and Belgian sets, had been destroyed.

We also lost the considerable food reserves my father had managed to store. He had been the administrator of several breweries and brandy factories in Russia (1941-1943) and had exchanged liquor for food.

In my father's defence, I should say that he did not enrich himself as did most of the other German administrators in occupied foreign countries.

While still in Warsaw I was able to buy some food on the black market, mainly smoked bacon. As my headquarters would not give me more leave for my studies - they claimed I was indispensable - I at least succeeded in getting a short leave to provide my father with some twenty kilos of food. I returned to Berlin on April 10. Because of all the problems involved in finding a new home and furniture, for the first time my father forgot my birthday on April 12.

The famous, unsuccessful plot against Hitler on July 20, 1944 was badly organized: it lacked the necessary spirit of bravery. *Claus, Count Schenk von Stauffenberg*, who had been severely injured in the Africa campaign, where he lost his right arm and an eye, was chosen to kill Hitler during a meeting of top commanders in East Prussia. Instead of killing Hitler face to face with a pistol, Stauffenberg placed a bomb hidden in a briefcase under the table where Hitler was standing. Stauffenberg excused himself and left the meeting intending to escape to Berlin on a pre-arranged flight. When the bomb exploded Stauffenberg was still within the well guarded headquarters. Even though the *SS* guards heard the detonation, they let him leave.

Hitler had only a few insignificant injuries, while four people were killed and seven seriously injured. Hitler escaped death because an officer had moved the briefcase containing Staufenberg's bomb off to the side, far away from Hitler's position. The bomb exploded at 11:42 GMT, near Rastenburg (54 N 05; 21 E 23). The plot could still have been successful. However all the Generals in Berlin and on the Eastern Front, who had previously been informed of the plan, hesitated to take the necessary actions after they heard that Hitler was still alive. Stauffenberg was shot on the spot. The other conspirators were tried and hanged.

This event could have had fatal consequences for my father, who was permanently in contact with one of the conspirators, *Julius Leber*, destined to become Minister of the Interior affairs in a new government. *Julius Leber, Adolf Grimme* (former minister of education) and *Dr. Walter Schreiber* (lord major of Berlin 1953-57), used to meet regularly in my father's house. It was extremely fortunate that the tortures Leber undoubtedly suffered didn't disclose this. Julius Leber was a brilliant politician. He had been a member of the government prior to Hitler's seizure of power. Unlike the two other politicians, Grimme and Schreiber, Leber was one of those who had clearly forseen how the war would end with all of its consequences.

There was another serious incident involving my father -- I only learned about it after the war-- which could also have resulted in his death.

Returning from Russia in 1943, he had told his colleagues how desperate the situation was, that the war was already lost. He described the scandalous behaviour of the *SS* towards the Russian population, the extermination of Jews and his own position with regard to Hitler's disastrous deeds. One major reported all this to the chief of the office, Colonel *Sachse*, who did not hesitate to take legal proceedings against my father.

One morning my father, who was preparing to return to Russia, was informed by a judge that he had to face a war tribunal on a charge of <u>defeatism</u>. Fortunately, it seems that one of the people in the judge advocate's office purposely destroyed the files so my father was not further prosecuted.

As a member of the intelligence with top secret tasks I had to leave Warsaw on August I, 1944, when the Polish uprising began. At first this appeared to be a well-organized guerilla attack taking place mainly in the city itself, and we believed it had the assistance of the Russian army already in the suburbs of Warsaw, near *Praga*. However the Russians had a good reason to let the Poles down without making any move to attack the Germans In the city, as the uprising was organized by non-communist, former Polish military personnel. It is no wonder that on October 3, after a hard struggle of 64, days the Polish forces under General *Bor-Komorowsky* surrendered to the German forces.

Now some words about deciphering during World War II.

When the war with Russia began German intelligence had organized a capable deciphering department. Assisted by the Finns, who had been at war with Russia since 1939, we were able to decipher almost all of the radio messages we intercepted.

Until the complete destruction of the German armies on the Eastern Front we knew the location of every Russian unit down to a regiment. We knew their strength in terms of personnel and equipment, and this was an invaluable weapon in the hands of the high command. It was quite different on the Western Front. There the codes the allies used were almost undecipherable. However, our German cipher experts did manage to crack the code used by the US Air Force for the organization of air raids. The German high command always knew the number of participating squadrons and targets hours before the air raid started.

Having left Warsaw on the day of the Polish uprising, August 1, 1944, we were transferred to a suburb of *Cottbus*, where I was again able to get a private room. Food supplies had become very short even for the military personnel in suburban areas.

My father, who was still on duty, supplied me with ration cards. He could spare them because he had managed to get extra food through his connections.

At the start of January 1945 we were transferred to *Klotsche*, a suburb of Dresden. Here all comfort diminished. The food shortages were causing real hunger but I still had the good fortune to get ration cards - especially for bread - from my father.

We used to go from time to time into the centre of Dresden by tram for a break. On two evenings while in the City, we heard the noise of approaching RAF bombers.

My friend and I were not worried, because it was widely accepted that Dresden, a city of no strategic significance with irreplaceable monuments and art collections, would always be exempt from any air raids. For this reason we usually just sat in one of the trams, which always interrupted their service at an air raid warning. February 13th, when we attempted to go into Dresden, there was an alarm, and we were forbidden to leave the barracks. This was because the actual front line was now much closer to Dresden; Russian troops had approached at some places as far as the river Elbe. At about nine that evening I decided to go to the office to do some work when the air raid alarm sounded. Shortly after, we saw the tracer shells illuminating the city and heard the countless explosions from falling bombs. Later that same night there was a second raid on Dresden, and a third one in/the morning. Luckily no- one from our unit was in the city at the time. The number of victims in this historic air raid has been estimated at over 100.000. The centre of the city and much of the surrounding suburbs were completely destroyed. We learned later that this air raid by British and US bombers was made at the request of the Soviet army to destroy a railway junction, that was vital for reinforcements and supplies.

At the beginning of April 1945 I travelled to Berlin as a courier. At this time the city was almost completely surrounded by Soviet troops.

For several years only very few Germans realized that Germany's struggle against almost the whole world was the devilish enterprise of the madman Hitler, and that an end of this disaster was to be wished with full heart.

However now, as the Russians approached the city, there was increasing anxiety because of all the deeds which the Russian soldiers were said to have done to the population in the territories they had conquered.

During my short stay in Berlin I was at least able to enjoy the arrival of a new violin, which a prominent violin maker in Karlsbad built for me by recommendation. I still have it. It can match many of the old Italian violins.

After my return to Dresden I succeeded in shooting a deer whose daily passage through our local woods I had observed before my trip to Berlin. For eight comrades this was a welcome supplement to the poor nourishment we had received for months.

On April 13, when the Russian armies were already threatening Dresden, we suddenly had to leave our quarters, each of us equipped with a marching order to go to the south into the as yet unoccupied German territory. I had the advantage that in my "soldier's pay book", actually my identity paper, there was the note " Warrant officer Alexander Marr should by no means come into contact with any fighting but, as a member of OKL intelligence, should be evacuated in time". This saved me from being recruited by any fighting unit up to the bitter end of the war.

After a very troublesome trip of two days I arrived in Austria near Passau. A few days later we moved again to the Styria, in the East of Austria. Our location was pastureland on the mountain side, near a provisional airfield in Aigen. When the US army approached to within a few kilometers, the population began plundering the food stores at the airbase. The rest of our unit was also engaged in plundering mainly food. liquor and cigarettes. The remainder of our unit headed towards territory which was supposed to be occupied soon by the US Army. Seizure by the Russians would have meant death or long imprisonment, especially for military intelligence personnel. When the advance columns of US troops reached the airfield and we heard the explosions of grenades, my friend Harald Hesse and myself decided to desert, because we believed it safer to stay in the neighbourhood of US troops. So we left the rest of our departing unit and stayed in the house of an Austrian farmer, where we exchanged some liquor for blankets and bread. However, next morning we saw there were no more US troops in the surrounding territory. It was the morning after Germany's unconditional capitulation. May 8, when we realized that the whole territory for more than a hundred kilometres had been abandoned by the US troops and left to the Soviet army.

This was an alarm-signal for us to start moving towards the safe territory occupied by the United States. Fortunately the Russians had not yet moved into the empty territory. With heavy rucksacks on our shoulders filled with food, we marched downhill to the main road. Here we saw an endless stream of trucks filled with German soldiers.

Rumors said the border of the US - Soviet demarcation line would be closed at midnight and that after then no Germans would be allowed to take refuge in the American zone. Bad prospects I The lorry we had manged to climb into stopped all the time because of traffic jams caused by trucks which had broken down or run out of petrol. To reduce the distance we often marched for a considerable time. Then when the trucks started moving again, we climbed up onto other vehicles. By then midnight had come along and we were still in Russian territory, about fifty kilometres away from the safety of the American lines. At dawn we saw a train that had been halted because the track was blocked by our lorries. When we heard that the train was going beyond the demarcation line to Werfen, my friend and I changed over to it. It had been highjacked by soldiers from an anti-aircraft unit. The train was not only full of soldiers but it also contained huge amounts of tobacco and cigarettes. We were able to supply ourselves with cigarettes, wine and liquor. There was much more than the soldiers could carry away. The following morning we arrived in Werfen and were at last safe from imprisonment by the Soviets.

Having no possibility to avoid being taken prisoner in Austria, my friend and I joined another airforce unit which was quite satisfactorily accommodated, being self-contained and without any US military guards.

Living in tents, we were allowed by the US officials to keep some rifles in order to defend ourselves against, as we were told, vandalising Polish displaced persons. There was a very limited and irregular food supply, but I had saved some ration cards for bread; we climbed the mountains near Salzburg and we broke into a supply hut of Alpinists. Now we had several kilos of flour that we could add to the diluted soup which was the only nourishment we officially received every day.

This whole internment lasted seven weeks. After about three weeks we had found our former military unit, well equipped with all sorts of food. I remember the first day with my old comrades, when I became sick after having consumed a whole tin of delicious "Gulasch". After a stay of two days in the prisoner of war discharge centre (Rosenhalm, Bavaria) I went to *Unterneukirchen* near the well-known place of pilgrimage, Alt-Oetting, where I had a reunion with my fiancée and future wife Hildegard 19ª. We married on August 7, 1945<sup>19b</sup>.

Here in Unterneukirchen I used to entertain US soldiers and some displaced foreigners with light and dance music, accompanied on an accordion by a Jugoslav. In exchange we received the full food rations of displaced persons, which could not be compared with the starvation rations the average German had at that time.

In September 1945 I hitch-hiked to *Fuerth* near Nuremberg where I expected to find a very good friend of my father, the owner of a brewery. I soon found out however that this elderly man had already retired, and now was living in a different part of Germany. In my searches for an appropriate job I met a former Colonel who was just arranging music bands for the entertainment of the US military. Nuremberg and Fuerth at that time had large concentrations of US military units. Holding a very favourable contract that required little work, I returned to Unterneukirchen to collect my wife and we returned to Fuerth.

There I was the band-leader of fifteen musicians. The music we played was supplied by the US army. I remember a lot of evergreens, foxtrots and rags.

At weekends I had a separate private arrangement in a US Red Cross Restaurant with a trio, i.e. piano, violin and cello. We played all sorts of light music. These jobs ensured we were never hungry. I was even able to supply my friend Harald, who had been the whole time with us, with food and cigarettes.

Our son Michael was born<sup>20</sup> January 2, 1946 . In February I went ahead to Berlin. My wife Hildegard followed with the baby in May.

In the intervening time I considered my future. I lived in my father's house which he was renting after two of his previous homes had been destroyed by air raids. It was a house in Berlin- Ruhleben, near the Olympic Stadium.

My first idea was to continue my short interrupted studies. However, I was told by the secretary of the Technical University in Berlin that there were several thousands of students who had already almost completed their studies in the physics and engineering faculties. He also asked me what I intended to do after four years of studies, when the factories had been destroyed or removed to Russia and England as war indemnities.

My other option was to make violin-playing my profession. I therefore went to the Academy of Music in Berlin to ask for an audition. I was lucky enough to be accepted and started my studies in April 1946.

Being one of the favoured pupils of my professor I was chosen to lead the academy orchestra and also obtained jobs as a deputy in several orchestras in Berlin. As a member of the students' committee I organized afternoon recitals, at which the advanced students could show their abilities and compete against each other.

Besides this, at the recommendation of my professor, I became a member of a quite distinguished chamber orchestra, "*Kammerorchester der*. *Mark Brandenburg*". It consisted of players from the Berlin Philarmonics and the Opera in East-Berlin, and was always conducted by well-known musicians. It was organized by the Soviet authorities, who at that time were very generous toward anything connected with music.

After two years of studies my professor recommended that I undergo an audition as a leader in a smaller orchestra or in a prominent one as a first violin or deputy leader. I started my career in the Berlin Radio Symphony Orchestra<sup>23</sup>. The Berlin Radio Station, although situated in the British Zone was, by agreement, occupied by the Russian authorities. I must say that this was my most agreeable job through all my artistic career. We only had one concert a week, there were only few rehearsals, and we were very well paid. This gave me the chance to play in the radio chamber orchestra as well as in other smaller ensembles.

At that time the German currency in Berlin was tied to the "East Mark", a currency that had been introduced by Russian authorities in both parts of Berlin as well as in East Germany. In West Germany the more valuable "West Mark" was the official legal tender. Everything went splendidly until the West German currency was introduced in West Berlin. Now for all people like myself, living in the western part of the city, everything had to be paid for in a currency worth four times more than the East Mark. To save a quite prominent orchestra and for reasons of prestige, the Russian authorities agreed to quadruple the salary of the musicians of the symphony orchestra who lived in West Berlin.

With my natal Saturn on the Ascendant I was cautious and did not believe the payment of the Russian authorities would compensate for the very strong value of the West Mark

A rival orchestra of the US authorities, the RIAS Symphony Orchestra (RIAS = Radio in the American Sector of Berlin ) took the opportunity to improve the standard of their musicians and offered auditions to any of us who wished to change over to the RIAS. As far as I remember eight of us took the opportunity and left within a fortnight<sup>24</sup>. Under normal circumstances this would have meant a breach of contract, but as at this time there were no rules or agreements between the two opposite unions, the Russian radio could not do anything about it.

The RIAS orchestra was being reorganized by the now famous Hungarian conductor *Ferenc Friscay* who had fired many musicians who were not up to the standard he was looking for. The orchestra improved very much, while before Friscay the RIAS had always been very disappointing to the critics. Although we were all very well paid, there were difficulties with the conductor and with the US authorities. Being on the committee of the orchestra I had much stress.

Unlike the Russian authorities, the board of directors in RIAS tried to introduce US rules and conditions for our musicians which did not fit the regulations and conditions of the German unions. For instance an elevenmonths salary for the whole year, not paying for the annual leave, was introduced. Musicians did not get any sick-leave and we had to use devious methods (swindle) to keep the salary of all of the musicians at the normal level.

Then the foolish *Mc Carthy* persecution also reached Berlin. Musicians were rigorously fired if they had belonged to any Nazi organization, even if only as passive members. Two other musicians were the victims because of unproven Communist activities.

At the same time our chief conductor, *Ferenc Friscay*, was turning out to be a complete neurotic.

Obviously unsatisfied with his own performances, he was much better with modern music than with the classical. He tried to put his dissatisfaction on the shoulders of the orchestra. For instance, during his first year he insisted on auditioning musicians he disliked. The committee had to agree to his demands. However, we arranged that these auditions be performed behind a curtain. This became a total embarrassment for him. In an audition some musicians of other prominent orchestras also participated and Friscay did not know who was just playing for the audition. When one of his most disliked cello players finished his audition behind the curtain Friscay stood up and said :

" This is a very good player, we should hire him at once !"

However I say in favour of Ferenc Fricsay that he brought the level of the orchestra to perfection, mainly by stressing precision. For instance, we never expected our success when in 1950 we went into competition with orchestras such as the Royal Philarmonic, Concertgebouw Amsterdam and Boston Symphony.

This festival took place in the *Champs Elysée Theatre* in Paris. Our two performances, one with compositions of the most gifted (in my opinion composer) of this century, *Bela Bartok*, the other with music of modern German composers. We never had expected the enthusiasm of the audience as well as the splendid criticism which our young orchestra received.

In the meantime, there appeared miscontent and all sorts of troubles between my father and my wife, Hildegard. Our three Leo Ascendants, with completely different characters, did not fit together. The result was that my father explained to me, with very poor and irrational arguments, that he could not stand us living together any more. Needless to say that in almost all accusations my father was wrong and, naturally, I defended my wife (August 26, 1952)<sup>26</sup>. My father did not reach his aims, for, although practically thrown out of our home, I succeeded in getting a new flat and bought some second-hand furniture (October 1, 1952)<sup>27</sup>.

Filled with hate and disappointment my father, who had only a small income at that time, asked me for financial support. I agreed. He was not satisfied with what I gave him. Instead, although not in any financial troubles because he had some unreported business he still was able to do at 68 years of age, he took me to court in the middle of November 1952 **28b** 

The first appearance in court was a full success. The judge, a woman with the right psychological instinct, soon found out that the whole action did not start because of financial but because of personal matters. She advised my father to drop the case. Our second appearance at the court was unfortunately handled by a young judge, who emphazised that I earned a lot of money, much more than he himself as a judge could earn. The result was a split verdict about the costs <sup>29</sup>

I should pay an additional small sum monthly to my father, much less than he had claimed. But in fact I never did, because one day after the verdict, i.e. March 22, my second son, Christian was born 29b, and according to my income, I was no longer obliged to pay as much as the court had decided.

The second half of 1952 was filled with stress and disappointments. Another incident encumbered my soul and my mind :

The committee of our orchestra was informed (October1952) that Friscay (still our chief-conductor) after three years of "cleaning" was still not satisfied with the composition of the orchestra.

A meeting was arranged, at which the other three committee members encouraged me to defend the orchestra against the conductor in this matter.

Unhesitatingly I told Friscay that only two months earlier, after a concert tour through Europe, he had stated in the presence of witnesses that he had no more objections about the composition of the orchestra. I added that as the elected representatives of the orchestra we were unanimously rejecting his new objections.

Two days later the secretary of our committee, suddenly and behind my back, called a meeting of the whole orchestra at which he accused me of having endangered its future and that we might not get extra recording work with "*Deutsche Grammophon*" Naturally I defended myself and a well respected violinist spoke in my favour. Nevertheless it was a miracle that in the ensuing vote "*to be or not to be*", (to keep me as a committee member), I got over 80% of votes in my favour, considerably more than I had at the previous official vote one month before <sup>28a</sup>.

The reader will agree that, especially in politics, in most cases--in such situations-- the accused person does not have much chance.

These days must have been very hard for Friscay too, because on the same day I attacked him, his contract with the Berlin Opera - House was not renewed.

Almost a year after this incident, at the start of our annual vacation (early July 1953) I was told that the director of music in RIAS would like to speak with the committee members of the orchestra. Of the five members only a colleague and myself were fortunately still present in Berlin.

At this meeting the director told us that there would be no money to keep an orchestra of this size, and that the best he could offer us was a contract to record some light-music. This notice meant there would be no established symphony orchestra in the RIAS after August 1953. We later realized that had none of the committee been in Berlin at that time, the light orchestra of the RIAS which was made up of musicians from diverse Berlin orchestras, and not an official orchestra with a contract, would have presumably been given the job. The amount of money involved covered only a fifth of our orchestra's budget. This was the start of a rather difficult time, especially for the committee members.

A meeting with my father's friend *Walter Schreiber*, the mayor of West Berlin, to get some money from the government failed. At that time Berlin received very few subsidies from West Germany. An invitation from the East German and Russian authorities to take the orchestra over into East Berlin with the full pay was considered, but we rejected this for many reasons.

Our problems were eased to some extent, when an obscure US recording company, *Remington*, signed a contract with us. This covered about thirty percent of our budget. They promptly paid for our recordings, but two years later all their recorded material was confiscated and sold to a German firm because Remington had illegally made use of *Marshall Plan* money.

The wages of our orchestra members had to be reduced considerably. With the money we still received from RIAS, Remington and Deutsche Grammophone we just managed to keep the orchestra together.

Now a Society, we feared that prominent members would look for other jobs. Fortunately this only happened in a few cases and the standard of the orchestra was maintained.

I did not stand for the October 1954 committee elections because, with four other members, I had accepted a job with the Radio Symphony Orchestra in Dublin. I arrived there on February 2, 1955  $^{30}$ .

In order to support a family of four persons, I decided it was too risky to stay with the orchestra society, which now called itself RSO (Radio Symphony Orchestra). This orchestra still survives, while *Ferenc Friscay*, our former chief conductor (until 1953) died in the early sixties from stomach cancer.

In Dublin I had the opportunity to play with several chamber music groups such as the Dublin Chamber orchestra and with a small group of four members, the Dublin Harpsichord Ensemble. These regular performances were vital for me, because I always found that playing only in a symphony orchestra did not provide the psychological balance I needed.

Besides my performing I taught violin in two Catholic schools. We stayed in our own house: life in Ireland was not too bad. In some ways this was my most happy time, although the standard of living in Ireland fell back from year to year by comparison with the West German "Wirtschaftswunder" (miracle of economic development).

During my stay in Dublin I was frequently approached by former colleagues, who since the re-establishment of German military forces had rejoined airforce intelligence. I was promised a good salary by a former superior. Frankly, I hated military service, wars and everything connected with them. However I had enjoyed my ciphering activities, if only because I was good at it. On the other hand the prospects of an adequate pension in Ireland were very poor and the risk of ending my musical career because of an accident or illness had to be considered. Finally I decided to return to Germany and to take the offered job. Here again I had to face some unforseen complications.

As soon as I had been accepted by the German authorities in April 1963, following a satifactory medical examination, I gave notice to the Irish radio authorities. However as the season neared its end, I still had not received any confirmation from Germany. As in all countries of the world, officials in government positions work very slowly.

To avoid being unemployed I managed to get a job<sup>31</sup> by recommendation of my former colleague in a Hungarian emigré symphony orchestra, the *Philarmonia Hungarica*, where I stayed until November 2, 1963. At that time I finally received the neccessary contract with the airforce <sup>32</sup>. There is not much to say about my deciphering activities up to my retirement in March 1, 1980. I had comparatively little work to do, because the Russiansavoided sending important messages over the air. Instead most of the telegrams went by wire. Nevertheless I had some success in deciphering Russian and Czech codes. The large amount of free time in the office made it possible for me to use a large computer and write the necessary programs for my astrological work.

On April 6,1968 my wife Hildegard left me and went with my second son *Christian* to Berlin <sup>34</sup>. I was guilty because I just had started an affair. Originally I had never dreamt of giving up my family and was surprised when my first wife acted as spontaneously as she did to leave me I later realized that, especially during our last years she had become discontented, fed up with housekeeping. She obviously preferred her freedom and the opportunity to have her own job. She subsequently regretted her actions.

In October 1968 I began living with my future wife *Dagmar*, although I had not started divorce proceedings.

My mother died on July 31, 1969  $^{35b}$  in Berlin after a stroke  $^{35a}$  a fortnight earlier. A modest inheritance  $^{36}$  from my mother and the assistance of Dagmar's uncle allowed us to buy a house, where we started to live in November 1969.

On May 15, 1972 my father had died at the age of 87 in his sleep<sup>37</sup>. He had never been seriously ill, had had no accidents and, as described earlier, was very lucky in his often risky enterprises. (Jupiter rad rising in  $8^{\circ}$  Leo).

On December 19, 1973, I was informed by a professor's assistant that I suffered from cancer of the larynx and that it had to be removed immediately. This was a great shock to me. 39 (Shock, ASC c conj PLUTO rad) One hour later I was informed by the professor that my chances of being completely healed with an X-ray treatment were seventy percent.

I learned later that, as any doctor should know, a cancer of the larynx in its initial stage of development never justifies the removal of the larynx but should be treated with X- rays or the growth removed by operation.

From January 3,1974 until the first week of March I had to undergo forty X- ray treatments. This was a very tough period for me and it is thanks to Dagmar, who took care of me in the best possible way, that I came out of it quite well. Then the professor said I was completely healed, although for some years I had difficulties if I had to speak too much, getting a sore throat and being hoarse for short intervals.

In August of the same year, after having lived with Dagmar already for six years, I asked my first wife Hildegard for a divorce. After three months of fruitless phonecalls with her I went to court and in September 1975 I was granted the divorce<sup>40</sup>. Hildegard went for an appeal.

The litigation lasted until June 27, 1977, when the appeal was rejected by jury in Koblenz <sup>42</sup>. On October 7 of the same year Dagmar and I married.

From when I moved to Trier up to the age of seventy, I participated in symphony concerts, operas and operettas as a permanent deputy of the theatre orchestra. This helped me to support my first wife as long as she only worked part-time. This quite considerable increase in my income made it possible to spend as much money as I have on astrology.

March 1,1980 | retired from the army in order to spent my whole time on research in astrology. I went to the United States on lecture tours eight times, and twice to Israel and Argentina.

On the occasion of my 70th birthday celebration which also coincided with my retirement from the orchestra in Trier, I gave a concert for invited guests.

I was first introduced to astrology in 1948. At first I felt no sympathy for it and did not trust it. I still only believe in those things I can see, control, or measure, and I do not accept any of the various religions which were created by man anyway. It was my desk neighbour-- at that time already a close friend of mine -- who asked me for my birthdate.

His delineation of my horoscope fascinated me even though it was performed in the traditional way, with dignities, detriments and rulerships, theories which are illogical if applied to all individuals in the world, as I later realized. With this face of astrology, dignities, etc, I have dealt in several publications. My friend, *Hans Weisse*, was a capable mathematician. He favoured the Campanus system of domification, worked out the horoscopes with logarithms and tried to do rectifications. The latter, as I later found, most often resulted in wrongifications. This is not surprising, for he used the fictional non-astronomical solar arc in eclipto (symbolic arc).

After I had experimented with the solar arc method and too-large orbs, I soon found out that this way of tracing events and rectification had no chances in eliminating coincidence and getting true scientific results.

It was the book of *Carl Kühr, "Berechnung der Ereigniszeiten"* (Computation of Time Periods for Happenings) which became the basis of my further research. I continued to use the Campanus system, because it seemed to me to be more logical than the theories of *Placidus*.

In later years I was able to realize that the few rectifications of horoscopes which I produced during these early years where correct within seconds of time. In 1959 I published two sets of Campanus Tables  $34^{\circ}$  -  $46^{\circ}$  and  $46^{\circ}$  -  $57^{\circ}$  Nothern Latitude.

For those astrologers who still favour the Campanus system, it has to be said that only the edition for Europe (46 - 57) is-- as far as humanly possible-- free of errors, while computed to the nearest minute of arc and printed in offset from my original typewriter copies. The issue of 34-45 has been computed and checked with the same accuracy, but the publisher made many errors and he failed to include my errata sheet in the copies sold.

<u>In 1960</u> I met *Cyril Fagan*, who made a great impression on me, as a person as well as an astrologer.

In 1962 my attention wa drawn to the publications of *A.P. Nelson Page* and *Vendel Polich*. I was very much attracted by the astronomical as well as the astrological characteristics of their Topocentric system.

Despite having spent fourteen years with the Campanus method (the computation of the above mentioned Campanus Tables took about five continuous months). I began to experiment persistently with the Topocentric domification system and the primary directions connected with it. It took me about four months of intensive research to realize that this Topocentric system was the right thing, for which astrologers had waited for centuries. In collaboration with A. P. Nelson Page and Vendel Polich | produced RA-Tables, with explanations, for the use of primary directions. I computed this in 1969 with the aid of a large computer.

This large computer helped me considerably in all my astrological work. Rectifications were produced not in weeks or even months, but in a reasonably shorter time.

I always have been in the vanguard in the use of large computers, calculators and personal computers, spending the necessary amount of money which, at the time of their first appearence, was of course, considerable.

The above only briefly describes some of my astrological activities. More details are available in my other publications.

The two main planets in my chart are MARS high in the sky in IX near the MC, in its domicile Aries, and SATURN on the ASC- by tradition in its second sign of detriment, the masuline sign Leo.

SATURN receives an almost exact trine from the SUN high in the sky orb 3 ' of arc. This is of major importance, because the Sun is placed in a favourable position. The Sun also strengthens MARS with its approach In the secondary measurement. The Sun high in the sky, may also have reflected that I was a committee member in two orchestras, altogether for eight years. So far this SUN-MARS-SATURN combination has helped me overcome all illnesses and accidents, even those which were thought to be fatal, in a comparatively short time. Quick recoveries from Illnesses throughout.

As the reader can notice in my biographical notes, SATURN caused many serious, negative events in connection with my father. Although I was able to overcome all this, because of the benefic Sun, I bear some psychological scars.

The early separation from my mother is clearly shown by the square of VENUS to angular SATURN.

Although anti-military (Saturn) since my earliest life, I was 25 years in the *Luftwaffe* most of this (23 years) in the intelligence as a specialist in deciphering Russian codes.

Deciphering, the Russian language, and the military character of the job are without any doubt well symbolized by MERCURY, SUN and MARS in the IXth house.


My second profession was violin playing in Radio Symphony orchestras (15 years) and for 20 years in the Opera Orchestra of Trier as a deputy.

This is symbolized by VENUS in its best sign Taurus, in the Xth house (profession). My absolute pitch and a good proportional feeling and judgement I owe to the planets MERCURY, MARS and SATURN.

My abilities in sports, mainly in shooting competitions, are represented by MARS, which body also applies to hunting and my interest in discovering the world of animals.

My interest in all kinds of science is reflected by the trine of JUPITER to URANUS. This aspect becomes important because the MC is at their midpoint. PLUTO (OA =  $82^{\circ}$  24') in a Paran conjunct to JUPITER

(OA = 83º 20'), may also be regarded as a support of this configuration.



My MOON in the 2nd, trine VENUS, confirms satisfactory finances through my whole life and the fact that I was not a day without a job. Besides this, I always looked for secure jobs as an employee MOON (2nd house) in VIRGO, trine VENUS (10th house).

I had extraordinary support from my violin teachers and from my superiors in the airforce. This is symbolized by JUPITER in XIth. Much support was also received from notable astrologers, most of whom are mentioned in this book.

NEPTUNE in XIIth is without any doubts the most evil companion of my life. It was involved in a serious case of diphteria, not recognized in time; three doctors already had given me up.

With NEPTUNE in XII (enemies) I also had combat all of the Neptunian astrologers who have obstructed my work by not giving me an opportunity to publish articles in their journals. Neptune also indicates my bad habit of smoking. I gave it up about one year ago. My comparatively lucky life surviving World War II, serious illnesses and accidents-- plus a good instinct in decisions-- I partly owe to SIRIUS rising.

People who have met me will have noticed, that I have an absolutely extrovert personality. This is reflected by the position of four radical planets high in the sky and the distribution of planets on the east side of the horoscope.

# The Horoscopes of Astrologers The structure and effect of juminaries and planets.

#### The SUN

will be found in major places of the map, preferably on the MC or high in the sky (1Xth or Xth), for Presidents of astrological societies. This is a frequent position of the Sun in horoscopes of prominent individuals.

## The MOON

indicates popularity.

#### MERCURY

The planet of intellect is most effective when combined with : a) JUPITER and/or URANUS. This is an indication of talented, scientifically-oriented astrologers.

b) with NEPTUNE it produces astrologers who are very capable lecturers and writers.

#### UENUS

Does not play an important role in astrological matters.

#### MARS

When cardinal and in benevolent aspect to MERCURY and SATURN, MARS gives a good sense of proportion, an extraordinary talent for estimating and an objective judgment.

#### JUPITER

If in major positions, JUPITER guarantees success and even fame. The success of those astrologers who have Jupiter combined with a strong, preferably angular NEPTUNE is more often due to their adroit behaviour נבון צייצ בירא. and popularity than to any serious astrological achievements.

#### SATURN

If in cardinal places (preferably angular) and not afflicted, SATURN is one of the most important planets in the maps of creative astrologers. With benefic aspects from MARS it provides steadiness, perseverance and patience.

Saturn, however, even in its strongest position, does not give up its negative characteristics. An angular SATURN will deprive the native of the rewards his work deserves during his lifetime. At best there will be a hard, long struggle for recognition.

### <u>URANUŞ</u>

is the specific planet of findings and discoveries. However, if URANUS is in a major position but is not aspected by appropriate planets, such as MERCURY and/or JUPITER, it will only provide a good instinct for valuable astrological insights. By itself it will not give the astrologer the initiative to accomplish serious constructive work.

## NEPTUNE


is the most obstructive planet for any science; it cripples the judgment and makes objectivity hard to achieve.

At its best, mainly when together with MERCURY, NEPTUNE produces what the author calls "successful writers about astrology." All the fictional matters that have come into astrology in the past two centuries and before (sometimes without any astronomical basis) are reflected in this planet.

#### PLUTO

does not directly affect the habits or talents of astrologers. In a few cases the writer noticed a tendency toward sensationalism.







The happy reign of George V ; "the faithful", is reflected by JUPITER in domicile close to the MC with an orb of a few minutes of arc, both in eclipto and in right ascension. That this reign was actually a heavy burden for him is symbolized by the angular MDO opposition of JUPITER rad (MC) to SATURN ep(IC). George V was in fact not the personality which is described In several blographies. Although honoured and loved by the British population, like several other British monarchs, he was a quiet shy person with some complexes. The efforts of his father Edward VII to make a perfect soldier out of him and other educational measures, rather weakened George's personality; the Pisces ASC and an unhappy Neptune in Aries deprioved him of the necessary " public appearance". This was well known at least to the people who lived close to him. The unfortunate pressure from George's father is satisfactorily symbolized by an MDO congruency, Edward VII MDO SATURN rad in opposition to George V MDO MOON والمراجع والمحصور rad.

The MOON symbolizes here the mental sphere of George V, decisively injured by his father's educational measures, which did not suit the son's character. George V's sensitive health and his temporarily unstable mental condition are symbolized by dominant NEPTUNE in the first house. It is surely not a matter of mere chance that a number of negative events in his life brought on illnesses, as did the death of his relatives.





#### Main, vital characteristics in Edward VIII's chart

In contrast to the charts of all other British monarchs, we do not find here any substantial indications for kingship. Jupiter, ruler of the MC in IV of the natal chart is close to the 5th cusp. This can be interpreted as follows: He was prevented from reigning because Jupiter (exile, Gemini) in IV, ruler of the 10th house, is near the 5th cusp. He abdicated because of a love affair with Mrs.Wallis Simpson. This Haison unfortunate for the country, is reflected three times in the Prenatal Epoch. We have here:

a) VENUS and URANUS in a close Midpoint to the Ascendant. This characterizes the unusual incident very well, moreover as VENUS (Wallis Simpson) is in detriment and ruler of the house of partnerships (DESC, VII).

b) These reflections are strengthened by a close zodiacal square of the MOON in I to MC and IC.

c) MARS (exile, Libra) within one degree on cusp XI (in eclipto as well as in OD) and in opposition to his domicile Aries is of course disastrous for all matters which may arise in connection with the symbolism of the 11th and 5th house. The king's abdication is not only a matter of the 5th house but also one of the 11th. Weakened MARS furthermore deprived the king of any substantial support from the authorities(no protection), or his friends, At the same time MARS, also prevented Edward from having any descendants (children).

Neither the radical nor the prenatal Ascendant are seriously afflicted; this secured him a comparatively long life-span, as was not the case with his father and grandfather. However we find a hidden indication for his death exceed by grands. A characteristic planetary position for this fatal illness in the radix is VENUS and PLUTO with the IC as a Midpoint, measured in RA (VENUS RA 51°28 plus PLUTO RA 70°44 = 122° 11': 2 = 61°06'; RAIC = 62° 31'). VENUS conjunct ALGOL may cause cancer of the larynx and other severe illneesses of the throat.

The writer himself has a very close conjunction of VENUS and ALGOL in his natal chart. This made him suffer from Diphteria, Angina, an operation of the thyroid gland and cancer of the larynx'. So far three cases of larynx cancer have been found in radices where Venus in Taurus was conjunct ALGOL.

The IC is , along with others, the cusp for the end of life. This was caused by the above-described Midpoint combination VENUS/PLUTO = IC.

Edward's unusual number of journeys to foreign countries, and his stay in France (in exile) up to the end of his life, is reflected by an exact conjunction of URANUS to the 9th cusp ( exact within 1 of arc in eclipto and with an orb of 18' of arc in OD on the 9th cusp). In some way the angular Midpoint combination of VENUS (exile) /URANUS = ASC in the Prenatal Epoch may also be responsible for Edward's fatal illness and death.

There are some other conjunctions of major fixed stars which, however, did not decisively influence his life. The radical MOON is conjunct FOMAL – HAUT; JUPITER conjunct BELLATRIX. The conjunction of REGULUS in RA to the RAMC of the Prenatal Epoch may be regarded of greater importance, although the Orb is 2 degrees, i.e. near to the limit of efficacy.



NEPTUNE d in <u>LEO</u> could symbolize the standstill of the weak heart. The ASC and IC aspected by the Sun and by malefics often reflects death. Here the afflicted Sun points to beart failure.

George VI's illness with the consequent death is very strongly reflected in the Prenatal Epoch with the oppositions of MARS, MERCURY and SUN to NEPTUNE and PLUTO on the Gemini- Sagittarius axis, indicating a weakness of the lungs. Besides this, the MC-IC axis in both the Radix and the Epoch lies in Leo and Aquarius. For both operations as well as for his death this Leo-Aquarius axis (heart) is heavily afflicted. Secondary directions ar also remarkably effective here. The Prenatal Epoch yields two very significant directions :

a)NEPTUNE (re sesq. ASC Epoch -Epoch) moves slowly during the Kirig's whole lifetime, its apparent motion being within the compass of one degree (stationary and retrograde) through all his life. In the Prenatal Epoch Neptune has an almost exact sesquiquadrate (orb 13 of arc) to the ASC. Its effectiveness with an admissible orb of  $\pm 2'$  of arc covered both surgical operations as well as his death.

b) MARS and SATURN, making a razor-sharp quincunx (orb 2' of arc) in the Epoch, formed an almost exact opposition at the King's death.

As frequently explained in the writer's publications, Secondary directions, progressed and regressed may achieve an immense strength especially when, as in our two cases, there are close aspects of the factors in the Radix (or here Epoch), i.e. MARS 150° SATURN and NEPTUNE 135° ASC.

However, if planets of slow motion are involved, it is almost impossible to time the maturation of an aspect for forecast purposes. On the other hand the direction NEPTUNE re sesq. ASC (orb 2' of arc) is an additional proof of the refined rectification of the Epoch.


George VI suffered from shyness and also from inferiority complexes when he appeared in public. Making speeches was very painful for him; he always feared he might bring himself into disrepute.

These inferiority complexes when appearing in public can also be found in the personalities of George V and Queen Elizabeth II. In all these cases SATURN played the main role. In George VI's chart it is close to the Ascendant tied up from two sides by MOON, VENUS and URANUS. JUPITER, the representative of expansion and of true royal behaviour, although in the best possible cosmic condition, could not help here: it squares the four above mentioned conjunctions of planets. His shiness and complexes are also well reflected in the Prenatal Epoch with the conjunction of rising MOON applying to SATURN.

As the Duke of York, later to be George Vi, was a son of King George V, JUPITER high in the sky, close to the MC and in the royal sign Leo, made it not unreasonable to predict that one day he would inherit the throne. Rising MOON in the natal chart, in an MDO conjunction with rising VENUS in the Prenatal Epoch (Radix-Epoch Paran), undoubtedly shaped his admirable personality. We may call him a philanthropist. He was a pioneer for the betterment of conditions in industry and in the relations between capital and labour. His work with the Industrial Walfare Society and his Duke of York's Camp were recognized as a major contribution in the field of healthy socialism.





#### Characteristics in the notal chart of Prince Charles


Of main interest in the Prince's chart is the question of whether it suggests that he will one day succeed his mother, Queen Elizabeth.

It has already been prophesied that he will not become a king. In the writer's opinion there are chances the Prince will inherit the throne, although the indications are much less persuasive than in the charts of his predecessors.


There is a very fortunate opposition of JUPITER, 29Sag53 to URANUS, 29 Gem56, which is similar to that of King George V.( JUPITER 25Sag40, URANUS, 28Gem34) The great difference however is, that this opposition is angular (MC-IC) in George V's chart, whereas the Prince's is in an unimportant sector of the horoscope. Favourable for a succession is the MOON in X, which however squares (applying) the Ascendant. The same close JUPITER/ URANUS opposition appears in the Prenatal Epoch, being in the very same fortunate tropical signs as before, dominating from the 10th house to the 4th. Another purely speculative indication is the fact that his son William has the ideal chart for becoming the sovereign of his country.

Thus : wether the reign of Prince Charles will be short and/or unfortunate or both, he should succeed Queen Elizabeth, unless he resigns or abdicates in favour of his son.

Prince Charles was not too successful in his development as a child - his marks in school were quite poor. Nevertheless he seems to have matured in many respects, thanks to a sextile of SATURN to MERCURY. His foolhardiness connected with several accidents, mainly in sports (MARS applying to the conjunction of JUPITER in Sagittarius), always ended in lucky escapes because of the fortunate JUPITER/URANUS opposition in both the radix and epoch. SATURN conjunct the 12th cusp in the Prenatal Epoch could result in severe illnesses and long hospitalizations, particularly at an advaced age. MERCURY square ASC in the radix and MERCURY opposition MARS in the epoch may sometimes cause sudden ill-considered and unfortunate decisions.

So far this analysis provided no absolute certainty that the rectification was correct, although the accumulation of events, and consequently also of directions - especially in 1980 - are obviously well separated and can be distinguished because of the limited orb allowances. As can be seen, successes and failures followed at short intervals in 1980. Nevertheless some doubts arrose.

The following method of ascertaining a rectification (verification) should be applied , in doubtful cases such as the one above.

#### Origin, significance and effectiveness of the ASCENDANT - LUNAR

(Prediction ///, page 31 - 50)

This very effective precessed Lunar, which I introduced in 1979, is the result of research into the mystery of conception, i.e. the Prenatal Epoch, which has something revolutionary in common with the natal chart. This has been consolidated beyond a doubt (1983) with over 50 provable examples.

Tradition teaches that the Ascendant or Descendant of the radix should <u>approximately</u> correspond to the ecliptical Moon position of the Conception horoscope, whereas vice versa the Ascendant or Descendant of the Conception horoscope should <u>approximately</u> correspond to the Moon position of the radix. This rule was not very far from the truth; however, astrology works with quite accurate measurements. In view of the great quantity of correct astronomical and very effective astrological systems, **with orbs which can be controlled.** In our case it was possible to work out and prove the fundamental rule for the true date and time of the Conception Horoscope.

# The ecliptical position of the natal Ascendant/ or Descendant should correspond to the position of the MODN in the Conception Horoscope.

In the mean time, this rule has been found to be valid in over 60 horoscopes where both radix and conception have been painstakingly rectified. Here orbs of a few minutes of arc – on the average of less than  $2^{\circ}$  – have been recorded.

The reader will now understand that a highly effective Lunar Return based on the position of the radical Ascendant or Descendant is in fact a Lunar which represents the Moon of Conception.

The reason why this Ascendant, or better Conception Lunar, is highly valuable to prove a rectification is as follows :

We may compare this Asc- Lunar to a magnifying glass, where the multiplier is 30 to one. One minute of changed birth time corresponds to thirty minutes in the ASC- Lunar time. This is because the Ascendant moves 15 of arc in one minute of time (average) and it takes the Moon 30 minutes in time to travel this 15 of arc. In other words, the slightest change of the radical Ascendant would make any Lunar of this sort unimpressive and interpret, because the essentiel factors of Lunars are Luminaries and planets near the angles - to be interpreted by their true symbolism giving the time period covered a special note. This is because they are related to the psychological experience of the native, which may be the result of events.

#### **Rodix Choracteristics**

The most effective combination in this chart is the triple conjunction of MOON, MC, REGULUS and the conjunction of SATURN to the Ascendant. Experience shows that people who become famous or infamous and who have decisively influenced the development of history have prominent fixed stars in important places of the horoscope, i.e. on Angles, House Cusps or in conjunctions with planets. In many unimpressive-looking horoscopes of V.P's with no angular planets, we find prominent fixed stars on MC or ASC. REGULUS is the fixed star of kings and leaders of state, it has a neutral character. Here on MC it promises fame and, with the MOON. popularity. The trine of PLUTO and the sextile of JUPITER strengthen and improve the positive characteristics of rising SATURN, which in many horoscopes, under bad cosmic conditions, appears as a pure malefic. In our case Saturn gave perseverance, steadfastness and also persistence. Under these conditions Saturn should also promise satisfactory health and a comparatively long life. The astonishingly accurate JUPITER-PLUTO opposition does not make any impression at the moment, because this is a non-individual aspect, lasting for days or even weeks. However their close connection to the ASC (sextile and trine) and near the III - IX axis, brought great success in internal (III) and external (IX) politics. This combination is of course also favourable for propaganda and elections (III). VENUS and MARS, although in insignificant positions, are in a wide sextile and, at least, they helped Margaret Thatcher not to lose the audacious war enterprise in Argentina.

Mercury close to the 12th cusp, receiving a quincunx from URANUS, has brought her much criticsism and opposition, but with the symbolism of URANUS also the ability " to make by instinct right decisions at the right time". It must however be emphazised that the instinct and luck due to Uranus are changeable. The <u>JUPITER - PLUTO</u> opposition in an individual and important position (III-IX), which by its symbolism often promises a succession, may also result in an overthrow, i.e. a succession by others. (When President Carter was not re-elected, he had an almost exact square of Pluto (prenatal transit) to Jupiter.

This may happen because of the group of transiting malefics (which has caused an unusual number of fatal accidents and disasters during1988-89) moving slowly through Capricorn. It will touch Thatcher's Jupiter-Pluto opposition in 1990-91. Here Neptune and Uranus especially may have a decisive, negative effect.

Of some importance for the unusual success of the English Prime Minister are certain prominent fixed stars

SPICA (benevolent) conjunct MERCURY (on Cusp XII) within 4' of arc has strengthened the planetary positions against criticism and enemies (XII). WEGA (benevolent) conjunct Jupiter (orb 12 ') has provided much support. MARKAB (neutral), a star of the second magnitude, is conjunct URANUS (orb 2').

It has strengthened favourable impulses.

As we have seen, this natal chart possesses remarkable cosmic combinations with extremely small orbs.

So far the most individualistic characteristics of this natal chart.

#### The writer's comments on the structure of Beethoven's natal chart.

Most significant for Beethoven's career as a composer are the three planets VENUS, JUPITER and PLUTO, high in the sky, and URANUS ascending within one and a half degrees. We have here two mighty midpoint-combinations: VENUS /JUPITER = MC = PLUTO. VENUS in the Xth house symbolizes music; its effect is strengthened by the above mentioned MC and PLUTO. However, composition of music depends very much on ingenuity, which is here symbolized by the ascending URANUS. Although the composing of music is based on ingenuity and intuition, it is closely attached to everything that we attribute to science. As the structure of notes and their intervals follows strict mathematical rules (proportions), this art which we call music differs greatly from the art which is produced by novelists, scriptwriters and poets.

In this case NEPTUNE, the planet of phantasy and illusion, supported by Mercury and/or Jupiter is characteristic for their talent and success.







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# Glossary

Ascendant-Lunar Horoscope: A horoscope calculated for the moment when the Moon transits the ASC of the Redix. (See under 'Conception -Lunar Horoscope')

**Conception-Lunar Horoscope:** A horoscope calculated for the moment when the Moon transits the Moon of the Conception Horoscope (Prenetal Epoch).

**Conception-Demi-Lunar Heroscope :** A horoscope calculated for the moment when the Moon of the Conception Horoscope' transits its opposite Ecliptic point.

Descendant-Lunar Horoscope: A horoscope calculated for the moment when the Moon transits the Descendant of the Radix. (See under 'Conception Lunar')

**DUAL TEST:** A rectification of the Radix as well as the Conception Horoscope(Prenatal Epoch) under rules, explained and applied in this book.

MDO: The Meridian Distance of a body divided by its Semi Arc and multiplied by 90 degrees. (See Prediction 11, page33, Genealogical Connexions... and page 41, Ascensional Transits.)

Natal Quotidian-Lunar: A Lunar Return Chart based on the position of the Moon in the Secondary Progressed or regressed Birth Map. (See '*Prediction using Common and Prenatal Cycles*', page 47)

**New-Partner-Horoscope :** A composite horoscope of two peole in which the time elapsed from the birth of the elder to the birth of the younger is deducted from the birth of the elder, and the chart is computed for the prenatal date and time thus found.

**Prenatal-Transit System :** Transits and Cycles before birth which result from <u>the</u> <u>deduction from the Radix</u> of the time (in days ,hours, minutes and seconds) past between the Radix and the Transit.( See '*Prediction using Common and Prenatal Cycles*')

**Precessed Solar (or Lunar) Returns :** A Return Chart erected in the tropical Zodiac but with the position of the Sun (or Moon) moved forward in the zodiac by the amount of precession since the date of the Radix.

Primary Directions : Directions based on the axial rotation of the Earth as distinct from Progressions in the Zodiac due to the orbital motion of the planets.

**Topocentric House Division :** The discovery of Vendel Polich and Nelson Page. The Poles of the House Cusps are slightly different from those derived from the Placidian method.

**Topocentric Primary Directions :** The special method of Primary Directions developed by Vendel Polich and Nelson Page in Argentina during the sixties. Features distinguishing the Topocentric from other systems of Primary Directing are the different formulas for calculating the Pole of the so-called Significator and its Ascensional Difference under that Pole. The time measure is the Mean Solar Arc in Right Ascension (The Naibod Arc =  $0^{\circ}$  59' 8.33 " per year).

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
